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STATE HOUSE POINTERS.

The government weather forecast for Tuesday is rain.

Frank C. Baker of the state board of agriculture is in the city to remain until after legislature meets.

Supreme Court Doings.

Salem, January 4, 1897. R. W. Getty, respondent, vs. Kate F. Ames, Frank Thibault, John Roberts, Eugene O'Connell, J. M. Siglin and E. G. Flanagan, respondents and W. O. Christensen and C. A. Johnson, appellants, appeal from Coos county, argued and submitted, this is a suit in equity to mechanics liens.

Isaac L. White, et al appellant, vs. Ziporah White respondent; ordered on stipulation that appellants come to serve and file a reply brief be extended 30 days.

School District 115 et al of Linn county, respondent vs School District 51, et al, appellant; ordered on stipulation that respondents have until March 2, 1897, to serve and file their brief.
