ELECTORS.

Republicans Meet at Salem to Cast the Vote of Oregon.

At 12 o'clock noon today John F. Caples of Portland, T. T. Geer of Macleay, E. L. Smith of Hood River, and S. M. Yoran of Eugene, Republican presidential electors met at the capitol to perform the duties required of them by the constitution and laws of the United States, namely that of casting their ballots for Wm. McKinley and Garret A. Hobart, president and vice-president respectively.

They also elect a member of the college from Oregon to carry the vote of this state to Washington, a job involving about a thousand dollars of mileage and picking, over which there is enormous strife.

Marion County Populists.

A special meeting of the Marion county People's party county central committee was held Saturday afternoon at the city council chamber.

King L. Hibbard, the chairman, called the meeting to order and stated the object of the meeting was to discuss and take some definite action on the matter of creating a committee to confer with the People's party members, of the legislature, regarding laws that would be most beneficial to the people. Geo. Weeks, the Howell prairie dairyman, moved that a committee be appointed by the chairman. Carried.

Chairman Hibbard appointed J. B. Stump, G. P. Cadwell and R. P. Boise as the committee; himself and Mr. Weaver being the remainder.

F. J. Beatty, T. C. Jory and Mr. Frohman were, on motion, appointed a committee to draft resolutions for the purpose of showing the sense of the party on legislative matters. The following were drawn up and submitted to the meeting:

Resolved, That our conference committee be instructed to use their influence to prevent the election to the United States senate of any man who has given his vote to or is favorable to a gold standard.

"Whereas, extravagance has been the rule with legislators,
Resolved, That they are instructed to use their influence to secure the abolition of all unnecessary commissions and the reduction of lawful expenditures and use their influence to secure such amendments to our ballot laws as will make election frauds impossible; that the clauses of the initiative and referendum be urged upon the committee with which our hall meet, in order that, if possible, some progress may be made toward its adoption."

The resolutions were adopted without a dissenting vote.

Dr. Guiss moved that a permanent committee be named, the duty of which should be to confer with the other local reform organizations in an endeavor to bring about a unity of action for the election of 1898. The chair appointed Dr. Guiss, Charles Miller and Geo. Weeks to act in this capacity.

Some routine business was then disposed of and the committee adjourned to meet on the fourth Saturday of the month.

Police Court.

BURGLARY.

A U. S. Mail Sack Stolen.

From S. P. Passenger Depot.—
Other Depredations.

Between 10 and 11 o'clock Saturday evening a bold robbery was perpetrated at the Southern Pacific passenger depot, located in the southeastern portion of the capital city. The baggage and express departments of the depot were forcibly entered and a mail sack and Wells Fargo & Co's treasure box were carried off.

For the past several months Mail Carrier J. M. Rader, who transports the mail from the postoffice to the depot, has not been making the 11 o'clock p. m. south-bound California overland regularly. Instead, he has been carrying the mail to the depot about 8:30 o'clock every evening, depositing it in the baggage department in care of the night operator, and then returning to the city. The mail arriving on the night overland was likewise consigned to the baggage-room where it remained until Mr. Rader arrived at the 6 o'clock northbound overland on the following morning, when it was taken to the post office together with what arrived on the morning train.

Saturday evening the mail was deposited in the baggage room as usual about 9 o'clock. Shortly after 10 o'clock the baggage-master had occasion to visit the baggage department for the purpose of checking several articles of baggage. Arriving at the door he was not a little astonished to find it standing partly ajar. Upon examining more closely, he ascertained that department had been entered by burglars. In the further examination of the contents of the room it was found that a United States mail sack, containing mail not only for way points but also for San Francisco, was found missing. With this exception nothing further was disturbed. Entrance to the room was gained by removing a large staple through which the lock passed, securely fastening the large heavy door. The staple was no doubt removed by a large steel picket pin, which was afterwards found upon the depot platform.

The burglars evidently intended to do a good job while they were at it for they also visited the express department adjoining that of the baggage room. It is thought they possessed a skeleton key for the lock was not to be found anywhere this morning. All that is missing from this department is Wells Fargo & Co's, "treasure" box but on this occasion it contained no treasure other than a small package for Miss Claudia Gilbert, who is attending St. Helens Hall, at Portland, together with a few way bills.

There is no clue as to who perpetrated the burglary. Those who are acquainted with the depot and its surroundings are not disposed to credit Saturday night's burglary to the unfortunate "hobos" at whose feet are laid all the depredations the perpetrators of which are not positively known. The public is inclined to believe that Saturday night's burglary was perpetrated by some party or parties who are perfectly familiar with the depot and the manner in which business is conducted there. Robbing the United States mail is a serious offense and should the guilty party be apprehended he will receive a heavy sentence in the state penitentiary.

These burglaries are being repeated in and about Salem quite frequently and it might be well to suggest that Salemites exercise every care in protecting their valuables and their property from the lawless element that is very evident about Salem.

About noon, Sunday, the mail sack was found about 200 yards east of the passenger depot. The sack had been cut open and three packages of long envelopes taken out. With this exception all the letters remained in the sack. Among the letters missing one contained a draft for \$350 on a San Francisco firm that was sent by G. W. Johnson. Another letter also contained a large draft drawn by Earl Race. Deputy Postmaster Jos. A. Sellwood was seen this morning and stated that no registered mail matter is sent out on the night overland. Any registered matter for San Francisco, is always sent to Portland, via the 2:20 local, where it is placed in a special mail sack.

The Wells Fargo treasure box was also found, Sunday, about two blocks west of the depot. It had been broken open and the only package it contained was taken away. The Express company never sends any money out to the 11 o'clock overland.

LARCENY AT COTTAGE HOTEL.—About 4 a. m. Sunday, Jack Thornton was arrested by Policeman D. W. Gibson on the charge of larceny from a dwelling. Mr. Gibson had kept a suspicious eye on the man for several hours and was not surprised to see

him enter the hotel. Upon reappearing, the man wore a different hat and the officer immediately arrested him. Thornton's old hat was concealed beneath his vest. When arraigned before Recorder Eides this morning, Thornton acknowledged having come into possession of the hat but claimed he was drunk at the time.
Thornton's case was continued until 3 o'clock this afternoon in order that Night Policeman Gibson might be in attendance at the trial as the principal witness.

A SNEAK THIEF.
About 7:30 o'clock Saturday evening a man having the appearance of a hobo, was seen to snatch a pair of pants and a mackintosh from the hooks just outside the White Corner dry-goods establishment and immediately take to his heels. He was pursued but managed to successfully evade his pursuers and made good his flight.

WHEAT.
The market opened a cent below Saturday's closing. London cables and the announcement of a bank failure, were the depressing items of news at the opening. Sellers were numerous, and the bears held the advantage during the session. The decline was checked by the demand for cargoes at New York, and large clearances from the seaboard points. With light receipts at primary points and good exports, we are not inclined to take a bearish view of the situation, and fall to discover any valid reason for a permanent set-back in prices, at the present time.

May wheat opened at 80 1/4, and cleared at 80 1/2. Cash wheat sold for 77 1/2. Liverpool January at 68 1/2 to 69. Visible supply 23,872,000, a decrease of 779,000.
