"Humanity."

After reaching Indiana Mr. Burcham suffered two severe strokes of paralysis from which he had almost recovered when he suffered a third stroke that proved fatal. Mrs. Burcham received a telegram Tuesday announcing Mr. Burcham's condition to have become serious and left on the 6th for the bedside of her husband, which she failed to reach before his death since he passed away on the following day. The funeral was conducted at Salem, Indiana. Mr. Burcham leaves a wife and five children, three sons and two daughters. Deceased was a member of the First Presbyterian church of this city. He was also a member of the Independent Order of Foresters.

U'Ren made point of order that it was never in order to lower the American flag.

Somers grew very indignant. He said: I demand that committee make a report in the name of the people of Oregon. We are determined to do business. Are we to be blocked by three men? Is this a monarchy or are we independent citizens?

Billyeu: I make the point that there is nothing before the house.

Somers: The whole state of Oregon is before the house.

U'Ren: Am I recognized?

Chapman: The gentleman is not present. He cannot be recognized until he arrives. (Laughter.)

Speaker Davis: The gentleman from Clackamas is recognized. (Applause.)

Somers: We Republicans have not enough to make a quorum.

U'Ren: (With great earnestness.) You elected 39 Republicans. Bring them here and I will help you make the necessary quorum of forty. (Great applause.)

At 3 p. m. there was still no quorum present. The committee on credentials will probably bring in three reports in the Noster-Huntley contest. The organization deadlock still continues.

LITTLE LOCALS.

Senator A. J. Johnson, of Lincon county, is the proud father of a bouncing baby boy. The new arrival came to Seio Sunday.

M. E. Parker has instituted a suit in the Marion county circuit court praying for a divorce from Samuel F. Parker, to whom she was married in 1879. Plaintiff also prays for custody of the three children and defendant pay \$20 a month towards their support.

T. T. Geer of the Waldo Hills, was yesterday selected to carry Oregon's electoral vote to Washington. Mr. Geer expects to leave for Washington about Tuesday, January 19th and may possibly remain until after the inauguration of President McKinley and Vice President Hobart. Mr. Geer is the first native Oregonian to be thus honored.

L. H. McMahon says his suit in Recorder Edes court, against H. W. Copeland, for \$17 alleged to be due on advertising account, was dismissed at his own request. He wished the case transferred to the Macley court and in order to do so, had to have the suit dismissed from the Salem court.

Chinatown was in a constant hub-bub for a time this morning. One of their number Lung Yeoung, who is employed on the D. L. Matheny vegetable tract, has recently taken unto himself a wife and the event was widely celebrated at Salem by the lighting of firecrackers and the discharging of other explosives.

Richard Hensley was today appointed administrator of the estate of Martin Rowley, deceased, who died January 8th inst, having real and personal property valued at \$2000. The heirs to the estate are: Herbert H. Rowley a son aged 26 years; Adda M. Harris, a daughter aged 24 years, both of Minneapolis, Minn.; Harry N. and John F. Rowley aged 16 and 9 years respectively, both of Salem. Mr. Hensley was also appointed guardian of the person and estate of John F. Rowley, a minor, who is entitled to the amount of \$2000, being an insurance policy held by his deceased father in the A. O. U. W.

CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

Following is the president's message transmitting the general arbitration treaty: To the Senate: I transmit herewith the treaty for arbitration in all matters of difference between the United States and Great Britain. The provisions of the treaty are the results of long and patient deliberation and represent concessions made by each party for the sake of an agreement upon a general scheme. Though the result reached may not be the view of advocates of immediate, unlimited and irrevocable arbitration of all international controversies, it is nevertheless confidently believed the treaty cannot fail to be everywhere recognized as a main step in the right direction, and as embodying a practical working plan by which disputes between the two countries will reach a peaceful adjustment as a matter of course and in ordinary routine.

"In the initiation of such an important movement it must be expected that some features will assume a tentative character looking to a further advance and yet it is apparent that the treaty, which has been formulated not only to make war between the parties to it a remote possibility, but precludes these fears and the rumors of war, which of themselves too often assume the proportions of national disaster. It is an eminently fitting as well as a fortunate attempt accomplished, that results so beneficial should be initiated, and kind-hearted peoples, speaking the same tongue and joined together by all the ties of common traditions, common institutions and common aspirations.

The experiment of substituting civilized methods for brute force as a means of settling international questions of right, will be tried under the happiest auspices, its success ought to be double and the fact that its ultimate ensue benefits are not likely to be limited to the two countries immediately concerned, should cause to be promoted all the more eagerly, the example set and the lesson furnished by the successful option of this treaty are to be felt and taken to heart sooner or later by other nations and will thus mark the beginning of a new epoch in civilization. Profoundly impressed as I am therefore, by the promise of transcendent good which this treaty affords, I do not hesitate to accompany its transmission with the expression of my earnest hope that it may commend itself to the favorable consideration of the senate."
