LITTLE LOCALS.

Frederick Kirn, administrator of the estate of John Adam Pfeiffer and Anna B. Pfeiffer, deceased, today filed his final account with the county clerk. The account will be heard Feb. 23, 1907.

H. Stapleton has instituted foreclosure proceedings against Frederick and Yenne Vander Baan et al., to recover the sum of \$600 together with interest from July 7, 1892 at the rate of 8 per cent.

Three hundred and twenty acres of land in township 7 south, range 1 west, this county, has been sold by Oliver and Esther A. Grace to Robert S. Skafie, the consideration being \$8,000. L. H. Turner and C. A. Davis have deeded to Chas. F. Hein 43.63 acres in township 8 south, range 1 and 2 west consideration \$1,500.

At a recent meeting of the stockholders, of the Capital National bank, officers were elected as follows: W. A. Cusick president, E. M. Croisan, vice-president; John H. Albert, cashier, Joseph H. Albert, assistant cashier. The board of directors was re-elected.

Margret Shafer, administratrix of the estate of Henry Shafer, deceased, has petitioned the probate court for an order permitting her to sell the real estate consisting of 160 acres in Jefferson county so that certain indebtedness against the estate may be settled. The land is of the probable value of \$2,000 and the claims amount to about \$1,700.

"Humanity."

William A. Brady's popular scenic production, "Humanity," a soul stirring melodrama by Sutton Vane, will be presented in this city for the first time at Reed's opera house Monday night January 18.

This author has the extraordinary faculty of grouping a series of sensational scenes and incidents into a plot and play without doing violence to the unities or common sense. For the groundwork of "Humanity," he has selected phases of English county squire and cottage life, supplemented by the more stirring scenes of English military adventure in South Africa among the Boers. There are the traditional English sporting ladies and gentlemen, horses, hounds, grooms, keepers, hung naturally upon a thread of romance; and there are the exciting scenes of war, personal combat, feats of soldierly daring, and the hardships of the British struggles in the Transvaal. With that country we have but very recently become familiar, the rising of Oom Paul to fame and universal honor over the downfall of the English freebooters who assailed the little Dutch republic of which he is president, having widely exploited during the present year. There is ample material in the Transvaal reads at the hand of the playwright, and Mr. Vane has put some of it to brilliant use in this piece. There is a battle scene between that curious people, the Dutch Boers, and the English, and a thrilling broadsword combat by the hero lieutenant and the Boer commander that for skill, weapons, handling horses, and exciting denouement, exceeds anything of the sort ever placed upon the stage.

UNION BIMETALLISTS

Met in the Turner Block Last Night to Endorse the Deadlock.

The Union Bimetallist League, of this city, held a meeting at the old Odd Fellows hall, in the Turner block, last night. Quite a number gathered in the hall to listen to addresses and keep informed on the work of the club. District Attorney J. E. Jeffrey, of Herling, Jackson county, ex-representative, and State Lecturer H. E. Hayes, of the grange, made addresses on the political situation and needed legislation.

W. M. Hilleary, of the state grange, was also present. Action was taken by the club to further legislation in the interest of the common people, of the state. After considerable discussion the following resolutions were adopted by the club:

"Resolved, By the Union Bimetallist Club, of Salem, Oregon, that we heartily endorse the conduct of those members of the legislature who are refusing to assist in organizing the house against the interests of the people and in the interest of the bootleggers."

"Resolved, That we, as citizens, mindful of the corruption which has existed in previously 'organized' legislatures, lend our moral support to the effort now made to organize the house in the interest of good government."

A committee, to procure speakers and arrange the program for the next meeting, was appointed.

Substantial Repairs.

The present "deadlock" in the Oregon house of representatives in no way effects or impairs the business activity always so noticeable about the plant of the Salem Consolidated street railway company. The cars that have served the company since its roads were first laid, are being elegantly remodeled throughout and when each leaves the car-shop on East State street, certainly has the appearance of a "palace on wheels."

Two cars have been remodeled and again placed in operation while the third is now rapidly nearing completion. The third will differ slightly in construction from the two that have previously been remodeled. It will have no vestibule and the car will be oblong in form. There will be two doors, located at the right and left hand corners of the car through which one passes immediately into the car. Seats will run lengthwise as in the other cars. The car will be hand-somely furnished throughout with all modern equipments. It will be an artistic job when completed and is being superintended by W. S. Sprague, of Portland. While the car will differ slightly in construction the finishing touches and the painting will be exactly like cars No. "14" and "20."

This is only the beginning of more extensive repairs and improvements that will be made to the line and property of the company as soon as the new management assumes management of the road.

REV. DENISON'S FUNERAL.—The funeral services over the remains of Rev. J. N. Denison D.D., who died in Grants Pass Wednesday night, will be held from the family home in that city Sunday afternoon. It is not known who will officiate but Rev. Jenkins pastor of the local church at Grants Pass, will probably have charge of the last sad rites. The remains will be interred at Grants Pass. Many Salemites will attend the funeral. Miss Abbie Mills, Supt. of the Salem Hospital, who was a half-sister of the deceased will go to Grants Pass via Saturday night's overland for the purpose of attending the funeral.

Since the Senators adjourned the House is more favored by the good-looking aspirants for committee clerkships.

"Little Dock Smith" fills the chair occupied by THE JOURNAL man two years ago. He was then with the Thirty.

Dolph had more votes on the first ballot than Mitchell will have. We will wager a home-made 16 to 1 cookie on that.

Senator Hobson, of Los Angeles, California, has already sworn his daughter in as clerk of the committee on public buildings and institutions.

The house deadlock is not over electing Mr. Bourne speaker. He could be speaker Monday morning if that were all. There is a principle involved.

Gentlemen, look the people square in the eye, and tell them: Are you anything but the Party of the Graft? Have you a particle of principle in your bosoms?

Senator Patterson was dropped hard by President Simon. But Patterson says he had only one clerk on his ways and means committee. This year it has three.

The people don't know where to find Mitchell on any question. They do know where to find THE JOURNAL. They are taking to the latter by the thousand and dropping the former.

The Eighteen defeated Hirsch and Mitchell in 1882. The Thirty defeated Dolph and Simon in 1895. The majority of the house ought to be able to defeat John H. Two-Face this year.

Charley Fulton's plan to organize the house with a quorum of 31 fell as flat as do belated enterprises usually. Besides it was raw as uncooked beefsteak, and immature as March grass for hay.

It took Senator Mitchell one hour and a quarter at the Salem opera house to thank the members of one party for what the members of another party once did for him. He made thirty-six such speeches for McKinley.

The ex-federal office holder's push at the state house is enormous. But as Mitchell has enough caucus votes "pledged" to elect him senator, why don't he go back to Washington? Are they not all honorable men?

The Eastern Oregon men who are talking Metachan for governor or senator meet with no personal encouragement from the state treasurer. But those closest to him don't deny that he is a possibility for either place.

Of course, the Statesman is well paid by the crowd that is holding up Senator Mitchell, making him believe they will elect him senator. But that does not convince anyone that the Statesman will not hold Senator Corbett for the same purpose when he comes along with his sack; or some other man on the last day, if he has a sack.

In direct violation of a sacred provision of the constitution, the senate yesterday morning adjourned for four days. The article of the constitution treating on this subject reads very plainly: "Neither house shall, without the concurrence of the other, adjourn for more than three days."

Yet the senate is "organized" by the "regulars." The house so far is a constitutional organization at least.

One of the \$5 a day push who is intensely patriotic tackled THE JOURNAL man and said it was shame to not organize this House when so much needed legislation was demanded. "I have a bill in my pocket," he said, "to compel every school board to buy a flag, float it over the building and teach the rising generation to salute it every morning." He was told if he would add to the bill a requirement that in every schoolroom should be suspended

the motto of Thomas Jefferson: "I will never by any act of mine in public life consent to take one dollar at the expense of the people." THE JOURNAL would support his bill. The pie-counter man looked disgusted.
