MR. BOURNE.

There is not a particle of sense in the abuse and outcry against Hon. Johnathan Bourne, of Multnomah county. When he fought the Dolph-Simon-Scott combination last spring at the Portland primaries and forced the issue to a successful termination in the state convention he was lauded as a hero by the same Republicans that a few months later demanded his resignation as secretary of the state central committee because he would not compromise himself as a silver Republican.

Mr. Bourne is a gentleman and a man of his word. He is a man of brains and large resources and it is evident he has the ability and the courage to make use of them on any occasion. He is loyal to his friends, who declare he is the fittest man for speaker, or even for greater honors. He came to Salem, a week ago Saturday night, with enough pledges to elect him speaker of the house. Some of the Mitchell managers, in the interest of the old machine, took away some of those pledges with the pressure of federal patronage and promises of appropriations. Their improper interference has deadlocked the legislature, and Mr. Bourne could not, up to Saturday night, "organize" the legislature if he wanted to.

Now they blame Mr. Bourne, when Mr. Bourne, by their own acts, was made powerless to elect a speaker or organize the house. Is this fair or just? Is a man's word of honor no longer to be regarded in public affairs? It seems it is not by some of the gentlemen who oppose Mr. Bourne. Mr. Bourne was loyal to Mr. Mitchell long after the latter's managers had ceased to be loyal to Mr. Bourne, and he has no one to blame if Mr. Bourne, or his friends, demand that he first deliver his pledges before they lay theirs on the altar of Mitchell's ambition.

Abuse of Mr. Bourne will accomplish nothing. As a silver Republican he has kept his record clear. He has compromised neither friend nor principle. Abuse will not get Mr. Bourne and silver Republicans back into the fold of Republicanism. The retirement of Mr. Bourne from the Republican state central committee, followed by the present campaign of abuse, does not augur well for re-uniting the party, even if Mr. Mitchell is elected.

READ THE SCRIPTURES.

The International Sunday school lesson for January 17 contained the following words which all Oregon legislators profess to believe:

"And all that believed were together and had all things in common; and sold their possessions and goods, and parted them to all men, as every man had need. And they did eat their meat with gladness and singleness of heart, praising God, and having favor with all the people." Acts 2, 44-47.

This was a religion and political platform after the spirit of truth and we commend it to the wrangling legislators. Gentlemen of the house, study the Scriptures!

The early Christians were like-minded, having the same love, confessing but one leader, loving their neighbor as themselves, and thus establishing the true brotherhood of man.

The Psalmist sang a thousand years before Christ: "Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity."

We commend the words of the Psalmist and the extract from the Sunday school lesson to the Oregon legislature. We fear they are not religious.

HOW TO ORGANIZE THE HOUSE.

Organize it right. The house should pursue a program of rigid economy.

Only a few new laws are needed. For a starter, abolish the railroad commission and one or two other commissions.

Scale down the whole general appropriation bill from \$200,000 to 300,000.

Create no new offices or commissions. Don't hire over fifteen clerks for committees; a more equitable plan would be to allow each member to employ a clerk if he has any work for that clerk.

It is no economy to taxpayers for a Senator or Representative at \$3 a day to spend the time he ought to devote to his duties as legislator in mailing bills, papers or documents, or writing letters, or copying reports, when a clerk can do it as well.

But the present system of giving the chairman of a committee of one party the right to swear in any number of clerks, with no work at their own, and all other members do their own drudgery is unfair, extravagant, and unjust to the taxpayers.

Take a practical example: Senator Dufur is a Democrat. He has no clerk and can have none. At home he has a stenographer and typewriter in his office who does all his writing. He has a large practice and never does more than sign his name to a paper. At Salem as senator he cannot get a letter written by one of the many stenographers. He must hire it done at his own expense while fifty or sixty clerks at \$5 a day are paid by the state to do nothing, many of them not even in the city.

THEY DEMAND RECOGNITION.

There were four Democrats, fourteen Populists and three Union-Bimetallists elected to the lower house. They will demand recognition of any man who is speaker, both on the committees and on the floor of the house when they come to present reform measures. If they do not get such recognition their bills will be pigeon-holed, or unfavorably reported, or they will be ruled against in all parliamentary matters. They are a strong minority, and a partisan speaker enforcing the earlike rulings of a Tom Reed would leave them in no position to represent their party or serve their constituents. This minority are worthy of consideration.

The time is past when a man can be sneered down in a parliamentary body simply because he is a Democrat, a Populist or a Silverite. Democrats and Populists were ruthlessly turned down in the senate organization. The same course in the house would leave nearly one-half the people of Oregon without representation in the organization. The minority will never consent to such an organization. They should not.

AN ELIGIBLE CANDIDATE.

The gold standard Republicans are undoubtedly a majority of the Republicans in this legislature. If they had a particle of doubt as to Senator Mitchell ultimately coming over to gold, they would not vote for him. They are sincere but should seek a more eligible candidate.

Salem has a Republican who would fill the bill. He is a man of excellent standing with all elements of the party, a young man of ability as a politician, of untarnished personal reputation. He is a man with no pledge to give offices to two or three generations of political barnacles. He is a native son of Oregon, and favorably reported Senator Dolph's gold standard resolution in the last Oregon Republican state convention—Claud Gatch of Salem.

Mayor Gatch struck the first blow for the abolition of the fee system in this city and county. His administration as mayor of Salem was clean and devoid of demagoguery.

The gold standard Republicans should recognize the younger element in the party and if they cannot elect Mr. Mitchell as a gold standard man they would find Mayor Gatch an eligible man to vote for.

Drainage of Roads Considered.

EDITOR JOURNAL:—A good deal has been said lately about the improvement of our roads and various plans have been suggested for that end, but most of them seem to me to be too expensive for the present condition of the country. One thing seems to be overlooked to a great extent and which is the first requisite for a good road, and that is thorough drainage. The average road supervisor thinks he has done his whole duty when he has scraped up a pile of dirt in the middle of the road and left a pond of water on either side of it, or when he has plowed a six inch ditch on either side to carry the water to the low part of the road. Road supervisors ought to be authorized to dig ditches through adjoining land where it is necessary to afford proper drainage for the road, and where necessary an engineer should be employed to survey these ditches so that they would be properly placed to do the most good. I know of roads that are impassable just now which could be made quite good by digging a few hundred yards of a ditch. If the roads were properly drained they would be fairly passable all winter for light traffic especially if broad tired wagons were used. After being thoroughly drained, then other improvements could be made as the needs of the country required. It would not only make the roads better but it would be a lasting benefit to the adjoining land. I think if road supervisors were appointed for several years subject to removal for cause, it would be better. A supervisor does what he thinks will do while his time lasts, the next one comes along and does the same or perhaps he undoes what his predecessor has done.

It would be well if our legislators would consider this matter, and not try to pass any expensive road improvement law, which I think would be futile.

Aaron Rose, the original proprietor of the Roseburg townsite, is very sick and is not expected to recover. A movement is on foot to organize a football team of pioneer residents of The Dalles, with Colonel Simot as president.

The tax levy of Washington county is 15 mills. This will give \$17,000 for state, \$21,000 for school the \$37,000 for county purposes.

The Douglas county court has let J. B. Tillotson, of Albany, Or., the contract to re timber the Roseburg bridge for \$2734.

H. A. Corless of Grants Pass one day this week picked up a \$55 nugget on bedrock in the Dry Diggings. It had been washed out last winter and had lain ever since unsuspected near his sluice box.

Albert Gantenbein of Oregon City who fell into a dye vat at the woolen mill on 14th died of his injuries this morning. He was 18 years old, and the chief support of his mother and nine other children.

Two farmhouses, one the residence of John Cox, situated near Lacombe, with its entire contents, and that of Wiley Swink, of eight miles above Waterloo, burned with all its contents.

The electors of Arlington district voted a 10-mill tax for school purposes for the ensuing year. Hereafter the terms will be for nine months each year.

The Commercial Club committee of The Dalles, has collected \$500 from citizens to purchase a diamond drill to bore for coal, and the drill will be in operation by the middle of March.
