

LEGISLATURE MAY ORGANIZE

This struggle has now entered the close of the third week. For only five days can these men draw pay. We believe the back of the facing-both-ways senatorial ambition is now practically broken and the legislature can be organized in the coming week.

The men who refused to enter an organization against which both conscience and judgment rebel have been carrying on a heroic struggle. There are men here holding out against what they consider an unjust proposition, who are not only paying out their own money and suffering losses in their business and future losses, as well, that they can ill afford.

What is the reason back of it all? They will not compromise their principles to help send a man to the senate of the United States, who has passed as a man of the people, but who when put to the test renounces his utterances and shows himself to have been a mere trimmer and demagog, trifling with important matters for political effect, and who for all the representatives of the people know will make men merchandise of all the confidence reposed in him in future.

A majority of the house members, of the Oregon legislature, refuse to consent to an organization at the behest of the Mitchell machine, and refuse to consent to an organization along the old lines of boodle and extravagance. These men are staying at Salem, paying their own expenses and not knowing that they will even receive the \$3 a day allowed them, for forty days, by the constitution.

The pay of a legislator, in Oregon, is entirely inadequate as a compensation for the services rendered. The state expects to secure the services of men competent to draft laws and attend to the origination of public business, and the inception of the enterprises commonly carried on by a commonwealth. What does it offer? The honor of putting "Hon." before a man's name, a voice in the state government for forty days, an opportunity to gain a valuable experience, pay your own expenses, neglect your private business, take needless abuse and receive \$120.

First Rough Draft of Bill

For Ways and Means Committee of Senate.

Following has been prepared by the ways and means committee of the senate but has not yet been considered in the committee for final revision. It is based on appropriations of two years ago and estimates made by the different institutions asking appropriations:

REFORM SCHOOL FUND.

For general expenses of the Oregon state reform school \$26,000 00
For improvements, salaries of teachers, of industries, etc for reform school 13,500 00
For electric lighting Oregon state reform school 1,500 00

JUDICIAL FUND.

For salaries of supreme judges, circuit judges, salaries and fees of prosecuting attorneys and clerks and law clerks and other necessary expenses of supreme court, including stenographer and for supreme judges in preparation of their opinions \$129,000 00

LEGISLATIVE FUND.

For pay of mileage and per diem of members and officers and other necessary expense of the 19th biennial session of the legislative assembly in addition to the amount appropriated therefor by act approved January, 1897, or so much thereof as may be necessary \$275,000 00

INCIDENTAL FUND.

For gas, fuel for offices and rooms, water, express, telegraphing, expenses of state teachers institutes for pay of laborers, messengers and other incidental expenses of executive, administrative and other departments for the supreme court \$28,000 00

For pay of officers and other general expenses of Oregon State Insane Asylum, including pay for the services of the trustees thereof as follows: For the governor \$500 a year and for the secretary of state and the state treasurer each \$100 a year to be paid quarterly \$275,000 00
