PROGRAM

For Graduating Exercises

Of Salem's Public Schools on Friday Night.

Since the last graduating exercises of the Salem public schools, the percent necessary for graduation in the several branches to be obtained in the final examinations has been raised several per cent. This was observed by a writer of the JOURNAL in looking over some statistics in City Superintendent G. A. Peebles' office this morning. Thus it will be seen that no class that has previously graduated from our public schools has been required to attain the standard of proficiency in all the requirements of the course of study that this class has. This is especially complimentary to the individual members of the class which numbers thirty-four instead of thirty-eight as was stated in Monday evening's JOURNAL.

The principals of the various city schools will hold a meeting at the East School building at 10 a. m. Thursday at which time City Supt. Geo. A. Peebles will submit his term reports regarding the attendance, examinations etc. of the term just closed.

The past week has been an unusually busy one for teachers and pupils. Examinations will be concluded Wednesday and the students will be given the two succeeding days to themselves.

The members of the graduating class met at the home of Prof. C. H. Jones, under whose instruction they have been the past term and enjoyed themselves. The professor's home on High street was taken possession of by the young folks who did not permit a moment to pass unemployed in pleasant amusement. Prof. Jones proved equally as proficient in entertaining his pupils in a social sphere as in instructing them within the school room. It was an occasion long to be remembered by both graduates and professor. The graduating exercises will take place in Reed's Opera House on Friday evening, a small admission fee of 10 cents will be asked to defray the incidental expenses. A very creditable and interesting program, which appears below, has been prepared and will be presented on Friday evening.
