Grim Humor.

Grayson Lewis, a St. Lewis commercial man, was in town Saturday, says the Roseburg Review. He tells a funny incident of the holdup. He was in the day coach, which is in the rear of the mail car, and the front door and windows of which were shattered by the first big explosion. STATE NEWS.

From \$4 to \$6 is being offered in the Coquille valley for next season's calves.

An original pension has been granted to E. A. Hart, of Perrydale, Polk county.

The star mail service from Port Bidwell, Cal., to Plush Or., will be increased February 10 to twice a week.

The regular term of court is in session in Union county and will last about two weeks. The docket has no serious cases.

The robber who signaled the train which was held up at Roseburg the other day held an umbrella over his head so he wouldn't get wet.

Engineer Morris says the robbers at Roseburg, blew the safes open by putting giant powder upon them and fastened it down with putty. They did no drilling.

Charles Fletcher died at his home, on Ten-Mile creek, in Coos county, last Wednesday, of dropsy. Deceased was 60 years of age, and had resided in Coos county for the past 25 years.

The McMinnville boys were called out by bugle. The call was promptly answered and the boys went through a course of military training such as real soldiers are subject to. Remaining on regular duty all night.

Richard Ayres of Libby, in Coos county, while at work in the Libby mine last Wednesday, had an epileptic fit, and rolled down the dump into the fire. He was pulled out after the clothing covering his legs was burned off.

Patents have been issued to James J. Tinker, of Portland Or.; Clifford C. Cuyler, of Arago, Or., not back; David F. Whiteman, of Oregon City, Or., washing machine; Seufert Bros. Co., of The Dalles, Or., two trademarks canned salmon.

The general merchandise store of Roney Bros., at Goshen, has been entered by burglars. About \$250 worth of goods were taken, consisting of furnishing goods, shoes, etc. The burglars entered by breaking open the front door. The officers have no clue. This is the fifth time, in as many years, that this store has been burglarized.

Stanly Glidden, a representative of several jewelry firms with headquarters in San Francisco, lost samples valued at \$8,000 by the burning of the express case at Roseburg. Glidden says that he usually carried \$16,000 worth when he comes north to sell his customers, and feels fortunate in having so small a stock with him on this occasion.

The Southern Pacific Co., and Wells, Fargo & Co., jointly will pay a reward of \$1,000 for the arrest and conviction of each robber engaged in the hold-up of train No. 15, on January 28, two miles south of Roseburg, Or., the standing reward of \$300, offered by Wells, Fargo & Co., is withdrawn and will not apply to this particular robbery.

News came this week of a rich strike in the Galice creek district. Ed Canfield, according to the report, has found the ledge which has for so long been the object of his search, and he, out of one little spot, took, literally, a haul of gold. For 12 years the lucky finder has been ground-slucing, working off the ground up toward where the mother lode was supposed to be. Existence of this lode has long been an assurance with Mr. Canfield through the fact of finding pieces of gold with the hard quartz adhering. No man ever stuck closer to a proposition, and his good luck is well deserved.—Grants Pass Mining Journal.

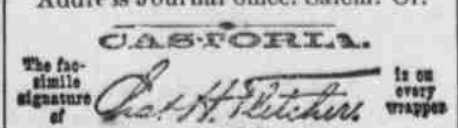
