AT MARION'S CAPITOL.

Business Transacted at its Various Departments.

The case of state vs. Willard Birchard, who is accused of the crime of rape on his daughter Minnie, came to a very sudden and abrupt ending shortly after opening the case before Judge Burnett Thursday afternoon. At a critical point in the examination of only the second witness, Jas. McCain, one of the counsel for the defense arose and moved a non-suit on the ground that not sufficient force had been used by the defendant in this particular instance to constitute the crime of rape. The motion was stubbornly resisted by District Attorney S. L. Hayden but it was sustained by Judge Burnett. There remain, however, two indictments charging the defendant with the same crime alleged to have been committed on June 1 and July 10, 1896, which will be taken up in their respective order. It is only hoped that justice may be meted out to the arch-fiend that Birchard undoubtedly is, considering the testimony that adduced in the preliminary examination conducted before Justice of the Peace H. A. Johnson, only a few weeks since. C. A. Williams, who was bound over to the grand jury last week charged with the larceny of an overcoat of the property of John Hegner was arraigned Thursday afternoon and was given a day in which to plead.

Felix Stirrup, indicted for larceny from a house, having stolen some jewelry from the residence of E. Meicher, waived time and was given a sentence of one year in the state penitentiary.

In the case of Alice M. Becker, executor of the last will and testament and estate of Geo. M. Becker, deceased, plaintiff, vs. W. A. Hummel, defendant, a verdict finding the defendant guilty of forcible entry and detainer as charged in the complaint of plaintiff was rendered Thursday afternoon.

The case of state vs. Frank Davis, charged with adultery, was called before Judge Burnett at 9 o'clock this morning before the following jury: W. H. Goulet, Frank Culver, L. Hobson, J. G. Moore, Adam Sander, John Murray, Theo. Reubens, Ben Gesner, Lee Tate, Wm. Flynn, Elias Burkholder, and G. W. Staples.

The defendant was found guilty, and sentence will be pronounced at 9 a. m. Monday, February 15.

When the Davis case had been disposed of the case of state vs. Gen. Sing was called. Sing is charged with larceny from a dwelling. At 11:45 a. m. a jury having been selected, adjournment was taken until 1 p. m., when the case was resumed. Wm. H. Holmes is conducting the defense. The jury consists of J. A. Dickey, P. Curtright, A. S. Hall, B. Pearson, P. K. Johnson, T. E. Caulfield, Wm. Miley, John Lichty, C. W. Yonke, Adam Snyder, John Murray and Elias Burkholder.

C. A. Williams, who was arraigned Thursday afternoon on an indictment charging him with larceny from a store, this morning pleaded guilty to petit larceny and received a sentence of thirty days in the county jail. Williams is the fellow who stole John Regner's mackintosh from the Columbia saloon only a few nights before circuit court convened.

Following are entries made on Judge Burnett's docket, this morning: Faber & Neils vs. C. B. Loughman, action for money. Defendant's motion for continuance allowed and case continued.

A. J. Baise vs. Chas. Armstrong, action for money. Settled.

E. W. Copps vs. A. E. La Roque, action on replevin bonds. Nonsuit by plaintiff.

Corra Snyder vs. Frank Kellogg, et al., action for money. Judgment as per stipulation.

Capital National bank, of Salem, vs. Richard Craig, action for money. Default and judgment with order to send attached property.

Geo. E. Aitken vs. Samuel S. Goldsmith, appellant, judgment for defendant on verdict.

State of Oregon vs. Frank Davis, adultery, pleads not guilty. Jury trial. Declared guilty. Appointed Monday Feb. 15, 1897 at 9 a. m. to pronounce sentence.

State of Oregon vs. C. A. Williams, larceny in a store, pleads guilty to petit larceny. Waives time and is sentenced to imprisonment in county jail for one month and to pay costs and disbursements of this action.

NOTES.—The grand jury will not be able to complete its work this week and it may possibly require the larger part of next week to finish the examination of the cases that have been submitted that body for investigation.
