OFFICERS ELECTED.

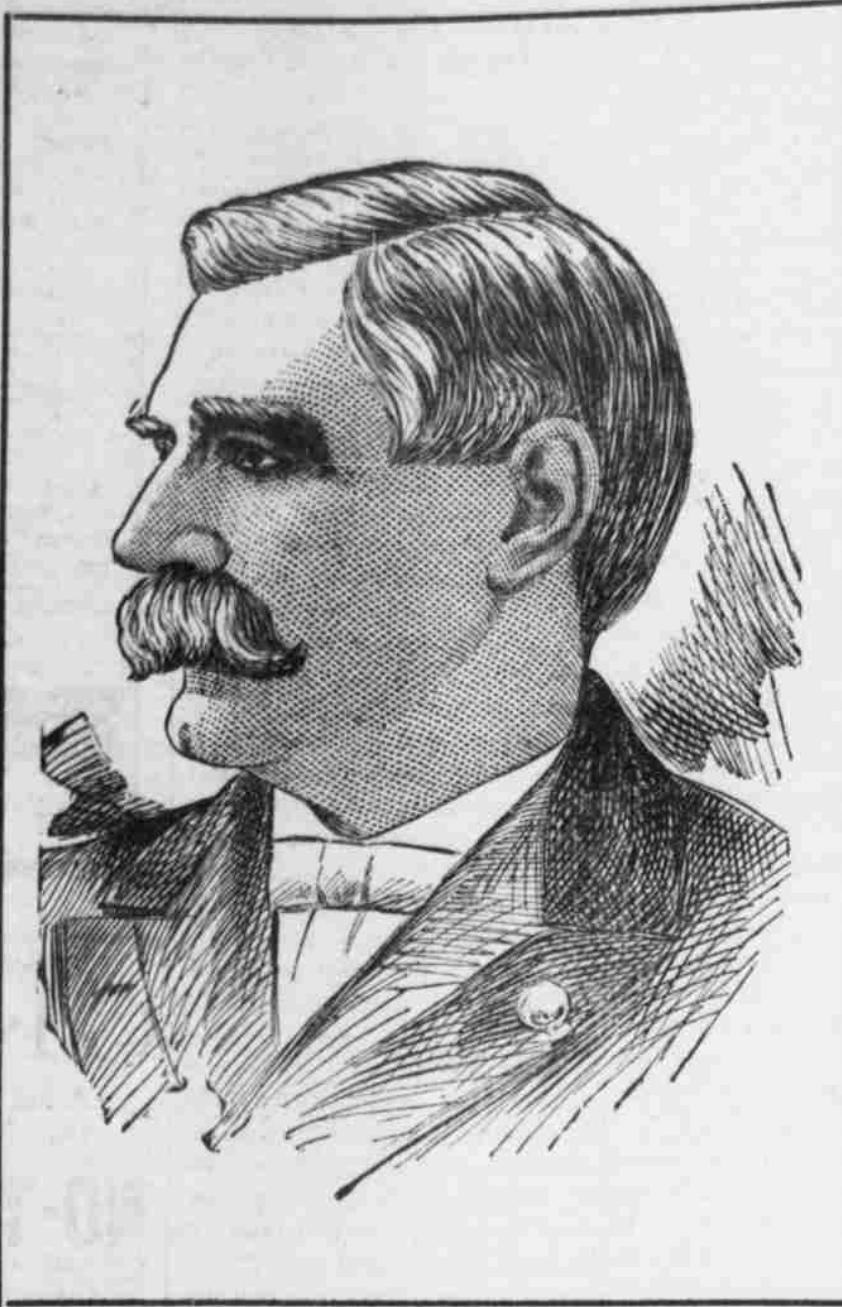
