AT MARION'S CAPITOL.

Business Transacted in Its Various Departments.

The following entries were made on Judge Burnett's docket Saturday afternoon:
John Savage, Sr., vs John Savage, Jr., action for money, motion to strike out new matter in answer sustained.
Ruth E. Sayre, executrix, vs. W. D. Mohney, et al., action for money; defendant's motion to strike out parts of new matter in reply argued and sustained as to certain paragraphs and overruled as to others thereof.

The following entries were made on Judge Burnett's docket this morning:
H. F. Jory vs. James Bottger et al., action for money. Defendant's motion to strike out part of amended complaint sustained. Motion to make amended complaint more definite and certain overruled. Demurrer to amended complaint overruled.

John Savage, Sr., vs. John Savage, Jr., et al., action for money, defendant's motion for continuance allowed and cause continued.

Wm. King and J. A. Marra vs. Hattie M. Jackson, action for money, ordered that plaintiff's attorneys produce and prove their authority to appear for the Plaintiff King and that until they do so all proceedings on behalf of King in this action be stayed.

E. S. Eller vs. Talkington, Bottger & Co., action for money, motion of defendant to make amended complaint more definite and to strike out same, argued. Demurrer to amended complaint argued.

Frank Davis, who was found guilty last week of adultery with Belle Fiesler, and George Sing, a Chinaman, who was declared guilty by a jury of larceny from a dwelling will be sentenced at 9 a. m. Tuesday morning.

BIRCHARD ON TRIAL.

The case of State of Oregon vs. Willard Birchard charged with raping his daughter Minnie on July 10, 1895, on which date she was under 16 years of age, was called before Judge Burnett at 1 o'clock this afternoon. Counsel for the defendant is making a hard fight, Messrs. McCain, Condit and Sherman making a strong trio. District Attorney S. L. Hayden and Deputy John H. McNary appear for the state.

Just after court was called to order the counsel for the defense moved that they be granted an additional witness in the person of Wm. Shanks, in addition to the five witnesses allowed by law that had already been subpoenaed. The motion was granted. The defense claims that Shanks obtained possession of some confidential letters Birchard had written Julia Birchard and had voluntarily turned them over to the district attorney to be introduced as evidence against the defendant.

The work of drawing a jury was then entered upon, each juror being closely questioned as to his qualification to serve in that capacity. A jury having been secured, the trial was begun behind closed doors, all spectators being removed from the court room.

NOTES.

The petition of William Miller for the probate of the will and testament of his wife, Jane Miller, who died in Salem on November 21, 1895, has been heard by County Judge Terrell and a continuance taken for a few days. Decedent left property, valued at \$6,400. All of the estate but \$5 to each of her four brothers, Harry, John, David and Charles McDonald, and \$10 to her daughter, Mrs. Jane Kellogg, was bequeathed to her husband.

Account of Mrs. Mary E. Syphert, executrix of the will of Margaret Stanley, deceased, was filed with the county clerk. It shows a balance on hand of \$317.63.

The petition of John Heidecker administrator of the estate of Christopher Frombs deceased, for an order to sell a note and mortgage, was granted.

E. E. Porter, of Ale, was today appointed bailiff of the grand jury to succeed Lawrence Condit, of Turner, who is suffering an attack of la grippe.

WITH THE MINISTERS.—At the regular weekly meeting of the Salem Ministerial Association this morning, only routine business was transacted. Only diversion from the usual order of business was a discussion of the accounts of the proceedings of the association that had appeared in the daily papers. No further discussion was had relating to the resolution that was introduced on Monday last relating to the services of the pastors at the assembly of the lower houses of the legislature until a legal and constitutional organization had been effected.

ON THE RIVER.—The Willamette this morning registered 13 feet above low water mark and was rapidly rising. The heavy rains of the past four days have caused a perceptible rise in the stage of the river. There is every indication of high water again. The boats are running regularly being somewhat inconvenienced by repairs that are being made to the locks at Oregon City.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

Liverpool market opened lower but recovered on closing. Our market opened one and one half cents above Saturday's closing. Wheat went up today without the help of cash buyers. Country millers report that farmers have been more willing of wheat since the recent decline. The trade is showing a gradual inclination to get over into July wheat. The talk of a corner in May wheat is perfectly nonsense.

Wheat, May wheat opened today at 75¢ and closed at 75¢. Cash wheat sold for 73¢. Liverpool 62¢ to 63¢. The decrease in the visible supply the past week is 1,227,000 bushels.
