AT MARION'S CAPITOL.

Business Transacted in Its Various Departments.

Following entries were made on the docket this morning:

E. S. Eller vs. Talkington, Bottger & Co., motion of defendants to make complaint more definite and certain was sustained. Defendants demurred to amended complaint was also sustained. Motion of defendants to strike out the amended complaint was overruled. Plaintiff given until February 17, 1907, to file and serve a second amended complaint, the defendant to answer same on February 18, 1907.

Ruth E. Sayre vs. W. D. Mohney et al., defendants motion for a continuance of this cause was overruled.

DAVIS AND SING SENTENCED.

Frank Davis was today sentenced to one year in the penitentiary having been found guilty of adultery.

Geo. Sing, a Chinaman, was also sentenced at 9 a. m. today to four years in the state penitentiary having been convicted of larceny from a dwelling.

The case of state vs. Willard Birchard is progressing slowly before Judge Burnett. It was about three o'clock Monday afternoon before a jury consisting of Benjamin Gesner, J. G. Moore, John Murray, C. W. Yonke, P. Cartwright, Bennett Pearson, T. Caulfield, A. D. Hall, Frank Culver, Lawrence Martin, J. Garb and Wm. Murphy, had been secured and the trial commenced. Only two witnesses were examined before adjournment was taken at 6 o'clock last evening. The case was resumed at 9 o'clock this morning and it will probably require the greater part of today and tomorrow for the introduction of all the evidence and summing up of the testimony. The case is being very warmly contested by both sides and the result of the case will be anxiously awaiting.

The case will be concluded sooner than was anticipated, nearly all the evidence having been introduced by 3 o'clock this afternoon. The arguments of counsel, pro and con then began and it is quite likely the case will go to the jury before court adjourns this evening.

Messrs. McCain, Sherman, Condit and Parks, attorneys for the defense in the Birchard case, have been assisted in the case by Attorney O. H. Irvine, a prominent lawyer of Portland.

Deputy Sheriff A. T. Wain was in Turner today on official business. He conducted a sale on execution on the farm of J. B. Dickinson near that city.

About 250 bushels each, of wheat and oats were involved in the sale.

J. W. Craik and Jennie Varrey; Wm. H. Donica and Edith M. Terry were the happy couples to whom County Clerk L. V. Ehlers today issued marriage licenses. In the latter instance, prospective bridegroom is only 20 years of age and the consent of his father, J. P. Donica was necessary before the required license could be issued.

The water was considerably lower today than last evening, but nevertheless the residents of this portion, of the capital city, are greatly inconvenienced by such overflows.
