GUILTY

As Charged in Indictment.

Such is the Jury's Verdict in Willard Birchard's Case.

Willard Birchard has been declared guilty by a jury consisting of twelve of his fellow-men of having had criminal intercourse with his daughter Maudie on July 10, 1895, at which time the girl was under 16 years of age. The penalty provides a sentence in the penitentiary for 20 years or for the life of the convicted man. Judge Burnett will pronounce sentence on Birchard at 9 a. m. Friday and it is rumored that if the penalty is sufficiently severe, the third indictment against Birchard will be dismissed.

All the testimony had been introduced shortly after 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon when arguments by the respective counsels began, period-a of one and a half hours being given each side for the closing arguments. At 4 o'clock the case went to the jury consisting of Benjamin Gesner, J. G. Moore, John Murray, C. W. Yonke, F. Cartwright, Bennett Pearson, T. Cavell, A. D. Hall, Frank Culver, Lawrence Martin, J. Garb and Wm. Murphy at 5:30 p. m. a verdict of "guilty as charged in the indictment" was returned. The prisoner received the verdict without any outward signs at all and maintained that apparently uninterested air that has characterized his appearance since the trial opened.

Judge Burnett's instructions to the jury were quite lengthy. The case was carefully reviewed and the testimony of the witnesses was carefully considered. After the instructions had been given the jury withdrew and after deliberating over the case for an hour and thirty minutes, returned a verdict as above indicated.

The council for the defense consisted of a number of the best criminal lawyers in the state viz: Messrs McCann and Irvine of McMinnville and Sherman, Condit and Parks, of Salem and that the introduction of evidence and cross-examination of witnesses was thorough and complete, no one will question. District Attorney Sam Hayden, assisted by his law partner, John H. McNary, appear for the state conducted the case very ably. This ends the last chapter of one of the worst criminal cases that has ever come before the circuit courts of this state.

AT MARION'S CAPITOL.

Business Transacted in Its Various Departments.

George Payne, a "culled" gentleman, who on the 13th inst. pleaded guilty to an indictment charging him with larceny from a store, was sentenced at 9 a. m. today to four years in the state penitentiary.

The case of state vs. N. Curl and C. Vaughn who were jointly indicted, charged with the larceny of a quantity of wheat and beans from a farmer, named Jos. Billeu, who resides near Turner, occupied the forenoon in Judge Burnett's court today.

The case was tried before a jury consisting of A. D. Hall, C. W. Yonke, Theo. Reuben, P. Cartwright, John Litchy, Frank Culver, Adam Snyder, S. H. Linton, Wm. Miley, Lee Tate, T. E. Canfield, and Ben Gesner. The defendants were represented by C. M. Charlton and Geo. W. Barnes, District Attorney S. L. Hayden appearing for the state. All the evidence was introduced by 11:15 o'clock when the judge delivered his instructions to the jury.

At 11:50 they retired and within five minutes returned a verdict declaring both defendants guilty as charged in the indictment. Sentence will be pronounced on the prisoners at 9 a. m. Saturday, February 20th, 1907.

The following entries were made on Judge Burnett's docket this morning:

Kola Neis vs. Phil Neis, action for money, motion to strike out part of reply sustained.

State of Oregon vs. Willard Birchard, rape. Defendant allowed until February 18, 1907, to file motion for a new trial and arrest of judgment.

State of Oregon vs. Geo. Payne, larceny in a store, sentenced to four years in the state penitentiary and to pay the costs and disbursements of this action.

State of Oregon vs. N. Curl and C. Vaughn, burglary. Jury trial, verdict guilty. Appointed Saturday, February 20, 1897, at 9 a. m. to pronounce sentence.

The grand jury returned two true bills this morning against J. R. Harris. He is charged with embezzlement of \$285 from J. H. Fletcher while employee in the capacity of collector for the Oregon Independent.

The second indictment charges Harris with the crime of forgery, having subscribed the signature "Oregon Independent" to some receipts while acting in capacity of collector. He was arraigned this afternoon when his Attorney A. W. Prescott asked until Thursday morning to plead.

The action for money case of Kola Neis vs. Phil Neis went to trial this afternoon before a jury. W. T. Slater and Wm. Kaiser are attorneys for plaintiff while Wm. H. Holmes appears for the defendant.

NOTES.

The grand jury has not yet completed its labors, there remaining several cases yet to be examined.

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CRETE.

Annexation Is Accomplished.

The Danger Line Past.

Greece Soon to Be in Full Power.

The Danger Line Past.

ATHENS, Feb. 17.—Copyrighted, 1897, by the Associated Press.—It is generally believed here that the Cretan feature of the Eastern question is now a thing of the past, and the landing of the Greek troops at Crete is not likely to turn out a casus belli between Turkey and Greece.

The absolute decision of Greece to persist in the occupation of Crete and protection of Christians on that island in spite of the attitude of the powers, is founded on the declaration of the Cretans that they are prepared to shed the last drop of their blood in order to attain their national aspirations, to which they add that they will not be satisfied with anything short of an absolute union with Greece. These circumstances were communicated by Greece to the powers and the policy of the Greek government has been carried out in every point.

An order of the minister of war, M. Smolenitz, has been gazetted, appointing Colonel Vassor, aide-de-camp to King George, commander of the Greek army corps landed yesterday at Platonica, a short distance from Canea. After explaining that the action of Greece is due to the fact that she is unable to any longer countenance the "lamentable situation of the Christians in Crete, to whom we are united by the sacred ties of religion," the order proceeds.

"The government consequently has decided to occupy the island in the name of King George and raise his flag over fortresses of which you will take possession. All your actions shall be accomplished in conformity with Greek laws, in the name of King George and on the responsibility of this government. So soon as you have landed you will publish a proclamation announcing the occupation of the island by Greek troops."

This has been done by Colonel Vassor calling upon the Turks to surrender. The reservists, who have been called to colors, are rapidly registering at the different military centers. It is hoped, however, that the most serious difficulty to be anticipated is the possible severance of diplomatic relations between Greece and Turkey. The annexation of Crete by Greece is fait accompli, and it is not thought likely the powers will do anything further.

Meanwhile diplomatic negotiations on the subject continue between the ambassadors at Constantinople, who, in turn, are in constant communication with the porte.

The announcement that Prince Nicholas will start for Larissa, Thessaly, with a regiment, tomorrow, created the greatest enthusiasm in military circles.

King George and the royal family, with the government, are in the highest possible favor with the people.

The Turkish authorities are in a demoralized state and are simply following out the recommendations they received from the foreign admirals, who are acting in accord and consult upon every step taken. It is thought the next departure will be the establishment of a provisional Christian government for Crete, pending the consent of the powers being given to the annexation of the island to Greece, though it does not seem as if that country was willing to wait any longer for the necessary permission and intends to administer all parts of the island not occupied by the foreign marines.

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BOLIVIA.

They Are Preparing to Fight.

Great Activity in the Various Departments.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—A Herald dispatch from Panama says:

A letter received by an official here from La Paz, Bolivia, states the Bolivia congress will declare war upon Peru. The letter also states that there is great activity in military circles, the army is being placed on a war footing.

The Herald's correspondent Rio Janeiro telegraphs that Colonel Morea Caesar, who was ordered to Bahia to suppress the rebellion of the fanatical bands under Conselheiro, has sent word that he must have more troops. He declares the strength of the rebels is largely underestimated. Recruits in large numbers, he says, are daily joining Conselheiro's band. The headquarters of the rebels have been removed from Candios to a more advantageous position in the disturbed province. It is feared there will be a severe struggle before the revolt is overcome.

The most serious allegations continue to be made as to the cause of the revolt and the means by which it is kept alive.
