BIRCHARD

Has Not Been Sentenced Yet.

Defendant's Counsel Files a Motion for a New Trial.

Willard Birchard was to have been sentenced Friday morning at 9 o'clock in view of which fact the circuit court room was filled with spectators, anxious to see what might be the sentence imposed on the father, who had been declared guilty of raping his daughter. Birchard's appearance in court that morning was in striking contrast with that he exhibited during the progress of the trial. When attending the trial he appeared cool and uninterested as any of the spectators and seemed altogether indifferent as to what might be the result of his case. Friday morning he stationed himself with his back to the spectators in the court room and placing his head in his hand seemed entirely unmindful of his extremely unpleasant surroundings.

When the case of State of Oregon vs. Willard Birchard, for rape, was announced, counsel for the defense stated that a motion for a new trial and arrest of judgment had been filed. The motion is a voluminous document and covers between 30 and 40 pages of typewritten copy. Owing to the fact that the action for money in case of Sayre vs. Mohney was in course of argument, the motion for a new trial was not argued until the Sayre-Mohney case was disposed of.

The counsel for the defendant claims as a grounds for a new trial that the stories told in the circuit court by the daughters of Birchard, differed materially from those told at the preliminary examination conducted before Justice H. A. Johnson immediately following Birchard's arrest about two months since. The motion for arrest of sentence and for a new trial was argued before Judge Burnett, this morning, and was taken under advisement. The defense claims a new trial on the unconstitutionality of the law in respect to the age of consent.

AT MARION'S CAPITOL.

Business Transacted in Its Various Departments.

At 4 o'clock Friday afternoon the action for money case of Mrs. R. E. Sayre vs. W. D. Mahoney et al returned a verdict for \$1,333.88. The original amount sued for was \$1,734.25 and 48 acres of land were also involved in the case.

The case of state vs. J. R. Harris charged with embezzlement was then taken up, the trial being by jury. After ten minutes deliberation the jury returned a verdict of "not guilty." The charges of forgery that also been preferred against Harris was promptly dismissed on motion of the District Attorney.

In case of Kola Nels vs. Phil. Nels, action for money, which was heard before Judge Burnett this week, the jury returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$2,350.12, the defendant's counsel yesterday filed a motion for a new trial.

At 9 o'clock this morning N. Curl and C. Vaughn were sentenced to three years each in the state penitentiary, having been convicted of the crime of burglary.

The following entries were made on Judge Burnett's docket this morning. Margaret M. Small v. B. A. Jacobs et al, election and damages, plaintiff's motion for judgment on verdict, argued.

H. F. Jorg vs. James Bottger et al, action for money, to strike out part of answer, motion to make answer demurrer and certain, and demurrer to answer argued.

E. S. Eller vs. Talkington, Bottger & Co., action for money, defendant's motion to strike out part of second amended complaint and demurrer to second amended complaint argued.

State of Oregon vs. Willard Birchard, rape committed on Minnie Birchard, July 10, 1906, defendant's motion for arrest of judgment and a motion for a new trial argued.

State of Oregon vs. N. Curl and C. Vaughn, burglary, defendants each sentenced to imprisonment in the penitentiary for the term of three years and they are adjudged to pay the costs and disbursements of the action.

The deed was filed with County Recorder F. W. Waters this morning.

Justice Court.

An action for damages was on trial Friday before Justice of the Peace H. A. Johnson, James M. Pugh has brought action to recover \$50 from William Townsend, alleged to be due for services in obtaining a loan of \$2,500 for said defendant. The case was continued until Tuesday at 10 o'clock. The case of the State vs. Edward Monahan, charged with burglary, was called last evening at 7:30 o'clock before Justice Johnson. John H. McNary appeared for the state and Prescott & McCourt for the defendant. A few witnesses were examined and adjournment was taken until 10 o'clock this morning.

The case was resumed before Justice H. A. Johnson at 10 a. m. today. After all the testimony had been introduced Monahan was discharged as the evidence of his guilt was not sufficiently strong to warrant binding the man over to the grand jury.
