DROWNED.

Steamboat Cook Chas Kreiner

Falls Overboard at 7:45, O'clock this Morning And Loses His Life.

Chas. Kreiner, cook on the steamer Ramona, fell overboard this morning while the boat was anchored at the dock at the foot of State street and was drowned.

The boat arrived down from Independence about 7:30 o'clock as usual and the deck-hands were busily engaged in handling the freight to be transported to Portland and way-points, about 7:45 o'clock employees on the boat heard a splash in the water and at the same time some one called for help. A boat was quickly lowered and a search instituted for the person who had fallen overboard but with no success. The search for the missing man, who proved to be Kreiner was continued until about 8:30 when the boat left for Portland. Before leaving Salem however the officers of the boat engaged the services of James Sullivan and Grant Flake to drag the river for the man's body.

Kreiner was between 30 and 35 years of age and his home is in Portland and he leaves a wife and little son. As to how the unfortunate man fell into the river can only be surmised at. No one saw him fall overboard, but Newt Tanner, who resides on Salem Prairie was standing on the deck surrounding the cabin and was the first to hear the disturbance created by the man falling into the river.

Kreiner, who has been suffering a sprained ankle, is supposed to have gone to the boat to obtain some meat which was kept there. When his ankle turned, precipitating him head-long into the water. Being unable to swim the man drowned before assistance could be rendered him.

This is the third such unfortunate accident that has occurred on the upper Willamette since December last, two of which transpired at Corvallis.

At 3 o'clock this afternoon Kreiner's body had not been recovered but men were still dragging the river at the point where the man fell over board there seems to be an upper current flowing northward while a few feet beneath the surface of the water there is an under current that flows southward. It is a difficult matter to ascertain the location of the body and it may be several days before it is recovered. Several charges of dynamite were exploded this morning in the vicinity where the man fell overboard, hopes that the disturbance in occasioned by the explosion might bring the man's body to the surface but to no avail.

Both Houses Take a Lay Off.

There was no session of Benson house today. It meets at 2:30 Tuesday. The Davis house adjourned until 8:30 a. m. Tuesday. A conference of the Mitchell men was held at 1 o'clock in room three but no action was taken. The senate met at 2:30 and took up routine business.

SENATE—MONDAY AFTERNOON.

Called to order at 2:30 o'clock.

Dr. Driver arose to question of privilege to contradict a statement in the JOURNAL, and with a rhetorical flourish said "Hofer, thou art a liar."

By unanimous consent the committee on ways and means reported mileage and per diem as published in Saturday's JOURNAL. Johnson requested that his mileage be reduced to a proper amount. Dufur also asked to have his mileage reduced one-half, as he made a trip with his committee, but didn't wish to draw mileage for same.
