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PUBLIC AND PRIVATE CONTRACT

In the latest issue of the Bulletin of the Department of Labor, Ethelbert Stewart has a striking paper on "Rates of Wages Paid under Public and Private Contract." The tables used in this article are results of an original investigation in the cities of Baltimore, Boston, New York and Philadelphia as to the wages paid, first, to those engaged on public work employed directly by the city or state, second, to those engaged on public work employed by contractors, and third, to those engaged on private work employed by contractors or firms. The figures seem to show quite conclusively that the state or municipality pays better wages for shorter hours than does either the private individual or the contractor on public account, and with evident approval is quoted the opinion that "the tendency of letting public contracts to the lowest bidder is to lower the wages of labor; that the lowest bidder is,
