MT. ANGEL POSTOFFICE ROBBED.—The postoffice, located at Mt. Angel, was entered early Tuesday morning and robbed of about \$165 worth of stamps and other supplies. The safe, in which the stamps were kept, was successfully blown open. Three men, who have been about Mt. Angel for several days, are suspected as being the guilty parties and their movements are being closely watched. The safe was entirely demolished by the explosion and about \$3 in money was also taken. John W. Ebner, the postmaster lost a check-book on the First National bank besides other valuable papers. Entrance was effected through the front door. Tools were taken from a blacksmith shop. An attempt was also made to enter B. Oswald's saloon but the would-be-burglars were unsuccessful. The noise occasioned by the explosion was heard about 4 a. m. Monday but no one suspected that it was caused by burglars and no attention was given the matter.

General Lee May Resign.

State Department Would Not Stand by the Consul.

HAVANA, Feb. 24.—The Associated Press correspondent saw Consul-General Lee, this evening, for the fourth time, today. Thomas G. Alford, correspondent of the New York World, was present at the time General Lee was interviewed. General Lee was reserved until shown cablegrams explaining the dispatches received in New York, relative to his reported resignation. He then said:

"I will resign if not sustained by the state department. Until now I have not received an answer. The question at issue is not the death of Ruiz, but related to Charles Franklin Scott, who was 13 days incommunicado. I asked that he be placed communicated immediately. Scott is already communicated, and the question has lost its importance."

The Administration Is Worried.

New York, Feb. 24.—A dispatch to the World from Washington says:

Fitzhugh Lee, consul-general of the United States at Havana, has resigned, but has been requested to remain at his post, for a time, at least.

The following cablegram was received at the state department:

"Havana, Feb. 24.—Secretary of State: My resignation mailed per steamer. Lee"

Secretary Olney replied to this almost immediately, urging General Lee to withhold his resignation until something could be done, and declaring that his retirement at this time and in such a manner "cause untold trouble."

After sending his dispatch, Secretary Olney hurried over to the White House with General Lee's telegram, sufficient number of United States supplies of war to make the demand good and, if it is not granted within 24 hours, that the city of Havana, and, if need be, other parts of Cuba, be bombarded until it is fully complied with and all American citizens delivered to the commanders of our warships.

Not Resigned.

HAVANA, Feb. 24.—General Fitzhugh Lee, United States consul-general, has personally handled the correspondent of the Associated Press a written statement saying that he has not resigned.
