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FLAXMILL.

It May Now Be Secured

The Old Salem Cannery a Suitable Site.

Dr. A. W. Thornton, of West Fendale, Wash., has been in Salem, several days, to ascertain if there would be an opportunity to establish here a mill to manufacture flax fibre.

He has been in conference with Portland parties and had also a proposition from Washington county to locate the mill there. He goes to Portland, Friday, for a special meeting with the Portland Manufacturer's association. Mrs. W. P. Lord will also attend that meeting, on Friday, and hopes to secure material aid at Portland to establish the first scutching mill at Salem, this season. The site chosen at Salem is the old Wallace cannery which has water power and is large enough. It can be leased with privilege of purchase if a company can be formed.

Dr. Thornton also conferred with Salem business men and it is believed a sufficient amount of stock can be subscribed to ensure success of the enterprise. A scutching mill to employ twelve men all the year and handle the crop of 600 acres will cost \$4000 to \$5000.

Upon the action of the meeting at Portland Friday will depend the location of the mill. If they can be induced to plant this infant industry in our midst we believe the nursing bottle, to support and keep life in the enterprise until it becomes strong and self-supporting, can be put to its lips here as well as anywhere.

It would reflect credit upon our city to help start this enterprise at Salem. It is bound to be started and bound to become a great Oregon industry. This can be shown and has been demonstrated by facts and figures, gathered and disseminated by the indefatigable industry and perseverance of Mrs. Wm. P. Lord of Salem. We shall be glad to report further progress.
