PIONEER.

Passes Away This Morning.

Mrs. H. A. Johnson Sr. Dies at the Family Home on Church Street.

At 7:45 o'clock this morning, Mrs. H. A. Johnson, Sr., departed this life at her home, No. 307 Church street, at the advanced age of 78 years after an illness of several weeks duration. While Mrs. Johnson had been complaining considerable for several weeks, her condition did not assume a serious aspect until last Friday when the physicians announced her ailment as paralysis of the brain. The aged sufferer rallied from this trouble when bowel complaint followed which was the immediate cause of her death.

The maiden name of the deceased was Elizabeth J. Whitley and she was born in Wayne county, Ill., on August 28, 1819. On July 25, 1841 she was united in marriage with H. A. Johnson in Pike county, where they resided for years.

In April 1847, Mr. and Mrs. Johnson started from Pittsfield, Ill., for the Willamette valley. They came overland with a party numbering twenty-three wagons. There was neither a bridge nor a ferry and the party underwent all the hardships and unpleasant experiences attendant upon such a journey at that time. The party arrived in the Willamette valley Sept. 10th and Mr. and Mrs. Johnson settled on a large farm near Jefferson where by hard labor Mr. Johnson accumulated considerable wealth, mostly in real estate. In 1862 Mr. and Mrs. Johnson removed to Jefferson when they conducted a mercantile store for five years when they again returned to the farm where they spent five years.

In 1872 Mr. and Mrs. Johnson came to Salem where they have since resided. The husband of the deceased preceded her to the grave on February 4, 1893.

Deceased leaves six sons and one daughter, viz: J. C., Geo. W., W. W., H. A., Jr., S. T., and F. M. Johnson; and Mrs. J. W. Harritt. All were present at the time of her death with the exception of W. W. Johnson, who resides near Moscow, Idaho. The latter has been notified of his mother's death but there being no telegraph connection with Burns, W. W. Johnson could not be notified of the sad occurrence.

The funeral will be held at 2 o'clock p. m. Sunday, at the Christian church. The remains will be interred in Rural cemetery.

In the dining room Mrs. H. H. Thompson and Miss Mae Boise poured the tea. They were assisted in serving other refreshments by Mrs. G. F. Rogers, Mrs. Jos. Baumgartner, Mrs. H. D. Patton and Miss Lucy Williams. The decorations were quite elaborate for the season consisting principally of Oregon grape, jonquils and laurel. There were great quantities of violets, both Oregon and California. California. The portiere of the dining room was an artistic combination of lavender ribbons and smilax, while violet and lavender lampshades shed a magical light over all. The parlors were decorated in pink ribbons and pink carnations.

Adopt Cuban Resolutions.

Will Read and Discuss Chandler's Silver Speech.

The Salem Bimetallic Union met Thursday evening with a large attendance at their hall in the Turner block.

Quite a number of guests were present, among them being Representatives U'Ren, Bilyeu, Ogle and Barkley, Senator Holt of Jackson, Frank Williams and S. B. Vanduyke of Denver, Col. The topic under discussion was "bonds" and it was handled very ably by the gentlemen above named and by Messrs. Cadwell, Boise, Sherman and others.

Little Besse Pugh created a pleasant interruption by a recitation that was thoroughly appreciated.

Among the many things said and done last night was the reading and unanimous passage of the following resolutions, submitted by Capt. D. C. Sherman, anent the Cuban struggle, to-wit:

"First, That we believe the struggle of the people of the island of Cuba is a justifiable revolution to secure independence.

"Second, We believe the war on the part of Spain to put down this revolution has been carried on with a cruelty and barbarism as disgraceful to modern civilization as it has been fruitless of success.

"Third, It is the duty of our government to recognize the struggle of the Cubans for independence and call upon the monarchy of Spain to cease this cruel warfare and give the Cubans their liberty.

"Fourth, We declare it is our duty, as free, intelligent and patriot Americans, to demand that our national government use all its influence to secure to the Cubans the blessings of peace and independent self-government.

The club decided to spend next Thursday evening in reading and discussing Senator Chandler's speech February 16 in favor of bimetallicism. Chandler is a McKinley Republican and proves that the plague and famine in India are largely due to the demonization of silver in India in 1893.
