President John M. Wallace

Sustains the Secretary of State—Colorado Experience.

Hon. H. R. Kincaid is in receipt of the following letter from J. M. Wallace, president of the Salem Water company, and a financier of good standing. It is dated Salem, March 1: MR. WALLACE'S LETTER.

DEAR SIR:—I notice with pleasure your decision in reference to the issuing of warrants or certificates of indebtedness beyond what is authorized by the legislature. I am satisfied you are right. I enclose you a clipping from the Greeley Tribune Colorado, which shows the result of such work. The state went beyond their appropriation to the amount stated and while it was admitted they received value received for every warrant, the decision of the supreme court had to declare them illegal and the people have refused to issue bonds to pay the warrants, although held by innocent parties. And such papers as the Greeley Tribune are still advocating their repudiation. The officials who signed those warrants would have been sued for their value, but as a general thing they were judgment proof. Let the responsibility rest upon the legislature and not upon the state officials.

THE COLORADO SITUATION. The following is the article referred to taken from the editorial columns of the Greeley Tribune of Feb. 11:

"Notwithstanding the supreme court of our state long since decided that our state warrants issued to cover over-appropriations were illegal and that the people have in accordance with that decision twice decided in elections advertised at an expense of not less than fifty thousand dollars that they would not pay them, our law makers still keep pegging away in the hope that we will pay them. In that hope the Hon. John T. Shumate, of Glenwood Springs, has introduced House bill No. 541 providing for still another election of the people to see if we will not vote \$1,300,000 for that purpose; or a modest one hundred thousand more than we were asked to vote the last time. It is likely that in repeated effort the bond beggars will finally wear us all out and have their way, but there is no danger whatever at present. Times just now are inauspicious, and even the argument that the credit of the state is languishing and our ability to borrow still more money, jeopardized by our refusal to be lumped into paying these worthless warrants, will be without its accustomed effect on the usually gullible country member. The majority have heard from their constituents too recently to ignore instructions and the bill doesn't stand the ghost of a show for passage in either house."

SCHOOL CENSUS.

Number of Pupils Enrolled in Salem's Public Schools.

The following statistics relating to the number of persons of school age residing within District No. 24, were taken from Clerk Bozorth's annual report. The school census was taken by James Allison and G. Van Wagner and the following estimates are thought to be correct:

Number of persons between 4 and 20 years of age belonging to the district at date of this report, males, 1451; females, 1373.

Numbers enrolled in the public schools of the district between 4 and 20 years of age, males, 947; females, 856; average daily attendance.

Besides City Superintendent Geo. A. Peebles, there are 35 teachers in the employ of the district.

SCHOOL MEETING.—At the annual meeting of the Sunnyside school district held yesterday the question arose as to who was entitled to vote, and after three hours' debate on the question, an adjournment was taken to get legal advice. Director H. H. Smith resigned, and a demand was made to have the clerk serve without pay. The question of greatest interest is the removal of the school from the Savage farm to Will Rice's corner.

INDIAN VETERANS.—Governor Lord has received letters from the members of congress at Washington backing up his effort to secure the passage of the Indian War Veterans' pension bill that has passed the senate. But the indication are they will not increase. No congress was never so loaded down with appropriations as this.
