WARNER.—At his residence on south Liberty street, at 4:40 a. m. Saturday, March 6, 1897, James Warner, aged about 55 years.

Mr. Warner had been complaining for several weeks but was only bedfast about two weeks. The immediate cause of his death was heart failure. Deceased is an old and highly respected citizen having resided in Salem for over forty years.

Deceased was born in Montreal, Canada, in 1832 where he resided until about 21 years of age when he removed to Cleveland, Ohio. A few years later he removed to Colorado, settling on a claim, the present site of Denver. Early in 1862 Mr. Warner came to Oregon settled in Salem, where he has since resided, following his trade, that of a painter.

On December 31, 1896 Mr. Warner was married to Miss Philopena Brey, who survives him. Besides two daughters and one son, viz: Mrs. May Roberts and Miss Clara Warner; Mr. Walter Warner, B. Warner.

Deceased was a charter member of Protection Lodge No. 2, A. O. U. W., which order he joined at its organization on August 18, 1879. Deceased also a member of Chemeketa Lodge No. 1, I. O. O. F., in which order he has been a honored member for twenty-six years.

Funeral services will be held from the late residence at 3 p. m. Monday and the remains will be interred in Rural cemetery. The A. O. U. W., and the I. O. O. F., to which the deceased belonged will participate in the services.
