COMMITTED SUICIDE.

Ely M. Wood, Formerly of This City, Ends His Life in Portland.

Ely M. Wood, who for the past eighteen months was proprietor of the bowling alley corner of Commercial and Ferry streets, committed suicide at the home of his sister Mrs. W. J. McKinney, in Portland, Tuesday afternoon by taking carbolic acid. (It health and trouble over financial affairs are attributed as causes for the rash act.)
Mr. Wood was a native of Texas where his aged father and a number of brothers reside. He came to Salem from the State of Washington in the summer of 1885 when he constructed the first bowling alley in this city. He was eminently successful in this business venture and his investment brought most satisfactory returns. He soon began drinking heavily and neglected his business and as a result, he lost many patrons by his dissolute habits.

Mr. Wood was a member of Silver Lodge No. 21 and Ridgely Encampment No. 23. I. O. O. F., of Silverton and a charter member of Salem Lodge No. 336. B. P. O. E. Chief of police A. C. Dille and a number of the other members of the latter order during the past few weeks have endeavored to persuade him to abandon his bad habits and let drink alone but the man was too much of a slave to drink to discontinue his drunken debauches. He leaves a wife in this city who was greatly shocked when she heard of the sad news. Mrs. Wood is an estimable woman and has the sincere sympathy of a large circle of warm friends.
Mrs. Woods accompanied by her two young children went to Portland this morning, in response to a telegram announcing her husband's suicide. It is quite likely the remains of Mr. Wood will be interred at Portland.

CAPITOL.

Doings Under the Big Dome.

Secretary Kincaid Will Issue Negotiable Certificates.

Mr. W. G. Jenne, of Portland, was the only notarial appointment made by the governor this morning.

The Pacific woolen and clothing manufacturing company, of Portland with a capital stock of \$100,000, filed articles of incorporation today with Lewis Russell, John E. Young and Charles Cooley as incorporators. The object of the company is to do a general woolen mill business at Portland. The flags were lowered to half-mast on the state house this morning on account of the late Rep. J. H. Kruse of Clackamas county.

INSANE.

David Nlyester of Linn county, aged 38, insane on religious subjects, was committed to the state insane asylum today by County Judge Barton.

SECRETARY KINCAID'S POSITION.

Under the Thayer decision of the supreme court, Secretary of State Kincaid has come to the conclusion that his duty to file and make a record of the claims against the state that are presented at the office.

For those wishing to hypothecate their claims, and the original vouchers will need to be made in duplicate. Those working at state institutions will have their vouchers made out by the superintendent, as has been the custom. The board through which such claims pass will certify to the correctness of the vouchers, in duplicate. The original can be filed with the secretary of state and the duplicate used by the claimant as evidence of his claim against the state. Those who are not under superintendents or boards can present their claims, certifying to the correctness thereof upon their honor. This can be filed or not, and a duplicate used if desired. The secretary will not issue receipts.

SOLDIERS' HOME.

The executive committee of the Soldiers' Home board was before the secretary of state for the purpose of ascertaining how and when that institution may draw from the public treasury for maintenance. The secretary of state considers the home upon the same footing with other state institutions, in recognizing its claims. S. B. Ormsby, of the committee maintained that the secretary issue some form of paper that would be more readily realized on than the original vouchers of the home's auditing committee. In fact, Mr. Ormsby stated he drew up the Soldiers' Home bill and that it carried with it an annual appropriation of \$12,000, for that was his intention. The bill provides that "there shall be appropriated out of the general fund annually the sum of \$12,000," but the secretary considers this only a promise to appropriate. There being no appropriation for the present biennial term, the home will have to present its original vouchers, signed by the executive committee, certified to by the committee's clerk. A duplicate copy of the voucher can be used for hypothecation.

Representative of the Monmouth normal school will be on hand to argue that institution's standing, relative to the biennial appropriation for its maintenance, deficiencies, etc.

COMMISSION MUST GO.

As to the railroad commission, the secretary of state is disposed not to recognize their claims against the state, unless compelled to do so by mandate of court. The secretary takes the position that the appropriation of two years ago did not extend over December 31, 1896. Since that time he has been powerless to issue warrants, and holds he is not required to recognize claims of the commissioners in any other way. Notwithstanding the decision of the supreme court in the mandamus suit compelling the secretary to issue warrants two years ago, in which decision it was held that failure to renew their bonds was not fatal to the commissioners' tenure of office, they have, since the failure of the legislature to organize, offered to renew their bonds. The governor has refused to approve them, and now the secretary does not propose in any way that can be avoided to lend color to their claims. The railroad commissioners must resort to the courts, depend upon future legislatures, or give up their claims.

AN APPEAL TAKEN.

Notice of appeal in the case of E. P. McCormack, trustee, vs. the Salem Consolidated Street Railway company, and A. P. Heintz and O. E. Heintz, doing business under the name of Heints & Co., as interveners and defendants has been filed with the county clerk. The interveners appeal to the supreme court from the decree of the circuit court rendered on November 10, 1896.

PROF. WINKLER WITHDRAWS.

Emil L. Winkler has withdrawn from the Willamette university musical department, and removed to his new studio over the First National bank where he will receive pupils in piano-forte-playing, harmony and composition.

Matters of Importance for Female Consideration.

There is room at Salem for a woman's club on a broad platform. Why not have one?

Mrs. W. P. Lord has interested the women of Eugene in the flax and fibre association. The fortnightly club on next Friday evening holds a flax meeting at which Mrs. Lord speaks.

The South Salem reading circle (which is almost a woman's club,) has omitted two meetings on account of the special meetings at Leslie M. E. church. It holds its regular meeting Saturday evening at 7:30 with Mr. and Mrs. E. Hofer. Subject: "The Hawaiian Islands." There will be the usual programs, besides short papers, and talks, ending with a twenty minute debate. The circle has nearly fifty members and is open to anyone who wishes to join.

THE FLAX MOVEMENT.

The women of Salem are much interested in the establishment of the flax industry, with the first mill to work up the flax fibre located at Salem.

Dr. Thornton gave a brief address to the W. C. T. U., at their annual meeting urging the members to form a committee to canvass the vicinity and stimulate their friends to attend the meeting on Friday night prepared to take definite action in subscribing for shares in the Oregon Woman's Flax and Hemp Fibre association and thus practically help the good work along. Promptness in action is of the utmost importance.

The W. C. T. U. appointed a committee to canvass the matter and they will be heard from at the Friday night meeting. There will be a number of lady speakers and a large attendance is expected.

The meeting was well attended, of perfect harmony and all present seemed pleased with the new officers elected. The committee on the Neal Dow meeting reported that there would be no joint meeting of the W. C. T. U. and Endeavorers, but the W. C. T. U. will observe Sunday, March 21, as "Neal Dow" day with suitable exercises.

The Salem W. C. T. U. has a bright future and the high character of its membership indicates that this woman's organization will grow in popularity and influence.

THE EUGENE ELECTION.

for school director will result in litigation The Guard says:

The rights of women to vote in a school election will be legally tested. Bright and early the prime movers in the woman's cause were out hunting top attorneys for consultation.

They regard the action of the judges who refused to allow them to vote yesterday as an insult to their womanhood. They announced that they were going to find out whether or not a woman can vote in a school election and that they had retained their lawyers for that purpose.

It is probable that criminal proceeding or a suit for damages will be brought against the judges who served yesterday. They are held responsible, as it is claimed that the board of directors had no right to instruct them to refuse votes of women and therefore, having not committed the act themselves cannot be held to answer. If a civil action is brought the case will first be tried in the circuit court and whichever way it is decided will probably be appealed to the supreme court.

CLEAN-UP

Should Be Had in Salem.

Opinions Pro and Con About the Filthy Streets and Alleys.

The Mayor and council have ample power to have the city cleaned. Salem is none too healthy.

Salem is none too clean.

THE JOURNAL is not the apologist or defender of the Salem Water works. It is a fact that there is as much other water used as city water works water.

THE JOURNAL made no reference to the Salem city water. In fact, not one half of our population take the city water. The truth must be apparent to anyone that the water supply has nothing to do with sickness in this city, for there is probably as much sickness in homes where well water is used as where the city water is used. There are cases of sickness on the hills round about the city, miles from city water pipes, as for instance at Morningside, Highland, East Salem and South Salem. In many instances the surface water in poorly constructed wells is no doubt the greatest disseminator of disease, if it is at all attributable to the water supply at this season of the year.

Many Salem doctors admit that our streets and alleys are filthy, and say that much less disease would be prevalent if they were properly cleaned up. Of course the M. D.s would have less business if Salem were cleaned up as it should be, but they are, or ought to be the first to strike for a cleaner condition. They ought to be the leaders of public sentiment for perfect sanitary conditions.

Salem has no more sickness than Portland and other Oregon towns at this season, and Salem has much less filth than any of them. But this fact is no excuse for Salem's streets and alleys remaining filthy as they are. Probably neither the condition of the water or the filthy streets has anything to do with the cases of fever existing, but that is no reason why both should not be improved if possible.

Fifty to a hundred men could be profitably set to work cleaning out our alleys and many streets before warm weather sets in. The street commissioner gets the curses for dirty streets and alleys, but has not the necessary authority to have them cleaned. The plain truth is Salem is dirty, and for one THE JOURNAL does not propose to lie about it. Let the truth be known, and let the mayor and council have the city cleaned up, if it takes two hundred men a month to do it. It would be a grand thing for the city, and unemployed laborers would not complain.

Doctor Mott insists that the water has nothing to do with causing the sickness. He concedes that our streets are in a deplorably filthy condition, and urges that they should be cleaned, but thinks neither the filth nor the water are responsible for the sore throats, German measles or other epidemic conditions.

Dr. Jessup has recently had 25 loads of foul mud hauled away from the front of his place on State street, where it lay nearly a foot deep. This is a practical object lesson by a man who knows the effects of filth, and could well be followed by hundreds.

The Statesman says Salem is clean—immaculate in fact. If the editor will look out of the back door of his office he will see the vilest kind of filth a foot deep, not to mention the stagnant pools of water standing there.

The city should be systematically and cheaply cleaned in the spring and fall. Let the mud, offal, manure, sawdust, refuse, and filth of all kinds be put in heaps and the state prison and other state institutions could have it hauled off as manure. No city could be kept clean as easily or cheaply as Salem if the city authorities could enforce the laws.
