SOLD.

Receiver E. C. Giltner Sells

The Salem Motor Railway Line for \$3,000.

At noon Receiver E. C. Giltner owned bids for the purchase of the Salem Motor Railway line. There was only two bids submitted, viz: F. S. Derby, \$25,000; A. Mason, \$30,000. Mr. Mason's bid was in the interest of the Salem Consolidated Street Railway company. The sale will be subject to confirmation by Judge H. H. Hewitt of department No. 2 of the Marion circuit court.

As receiver of the State Insurance company by whom the railway line has been operated as a part of the property, Mr. Giltner will tomorrow report the sale to the court. In reporting the matter, Mr. Giltner will recommend the sale. Supt. Anson, of the Consolidated, was seen today and said that his company had bought the line to operate it. The Motor Line franchise will become a part of the system owned by this company, and with a few changes one company can operate the whole plant more cheaply and give better service than two separate lines competing with each other at some terminal points.

What They Drink. At the present time business is quite lively with a Court street junkman. Since the legislators departed for their respective homes there has been considerable discussion as to the direct or indirect cause of the sickness experienced among the members of the house and senate respectively, while in Salem.

President J. M. Wallace, of the Salem Water company, besides a number of physicians, asserted that it was not caused by drinking city water. Their theory is evidently not altogether false from the information that was given a JOURNAL writer by a Court street business man, which proves conclusively that our law-makers did not endorse Salem city water, as an exclusive beverage during their sojourn in our city.

Since the legislature adjourned, the junkman has visited the headquarters of the respective political factions, for the purpose of gathering empty liquor bottles. The assortment he succeeded in gathering is certainly unique—all sorts, shapes and of widely varying capacities. In all the junkman succeeded in getting about three wagon loads, which were readily disposed of at a big profit to the junkman. And the gentleman informed us the greater number of the bottles were found at the ex-senator's headquarters.

To THE ASYLUM.—Sophia Smith, of Silverton, was today committed to the insane asylum after an examination conducted before Judge G. P. Terrell by Dr. E. B. Philbrook and District Attorney S. L. Hayden. The unfortunate woman is 40 years of age, and a native of Minnesota. This is her second attack having experienced the first one about five years ago. The woman is of suicidal intent. She was accompanied to the asylum this afternoon by Sheriff T. T. Wrightman and one guard.

At 7:30 this evening there will be the first public meeting at Salem to take steps to establish the flax and hemp flax industry in Oregon. If you believe in developing Oregon be sure to attend.

Mayor Richardson will be asked to preside. Mrs. W. P. Lord, Dr. Thornton and others will speak on what has been done to establish a plant at Salem. The first spinning mill is to be put in operation in the old Salem cannery plant, and at least 100 acres of flax and 50 acres of hemp are to be put in and manufactured into marketable flax at Salem. Governor Lord and Superintendent's Palace and Gilbert of the asylum and pen, and Supt. Potter of Chemawa Indian school have all given assurances of friendly support of the enterprise. In fact the whole average could be put in on public institution lands. But that is not desired.

While their co-operation is desired and will be very much needed. It is much more desirable that farmers and fruit growers in Marion and Polk counties put in from one to five acres each, and handle the crop with their families, and become shapers in the profits of the enterprise.

THE SPOILING MILL. At Salem will employ from ten to twenty persons the year around, but it will take \$10,000 capital to put in the first plant and run it until the first shipments of flax can be got to market, and cash returns are secured from sales. All this will be explained at the meeting this evening when a committee to secure stock subscriptions at \$10 per share will be appointed. This committee will be of prominent ladies of this city, who will make the canvass and it is to be distinctly a woman's enterprise. A well attended preliminary meeting was held at South Salem last night at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Jory.

The JOURNAL bespeaks for this industry the hearty encouragement and support of our citizens. This is entirely an industrial enterprise, and should receive support from the heart and the shoulder, regardless of political or social distinctions. Salem and Oregon must get a move on if we are to better the condition of farmer, laborer or business men.
