A farmer has been appointed farmer at the state reform school.

This indicates that the board intends to look at qualifications and not to approve anyone lacking them.

The postmaster general announces that he will continue in force the rules governing appointment in the postoffice department without change. Under the present regulations senators are entitled to appoint the postmaster at their home residence. This would give Senator McBride the appointment of the postmaster at St. Helens.

At Salem there has been much said about a certain newspaper selling out. From the nature of the service it renders in shaping up intelligent public opinion, a newspaper is unavoidably a public servant. A newspaper that can be silenced upon all important occasions and in behalf of every bad cause, is in the nature of things a bad servant of the public. The general impression is that one of our esteemed contemporaries can be too easily silenced.

Saturday a Salem woman went into a McKinley grocery and got two pounds less of sugar for fifty cents than she got before the November election. "It's because the new tariff is going to be put on," said the grocer, "but that is not all. It is going still higher, and all other things are going to be higher." He told her, however, that there might also be a rise in wages. "Well I'll believe it when I see it," said the Salem woman. It takes a woman to let the wind out of "confidence."
