A Supreme Court Verdict.

Remarkable Litigation Begun in a
Justice Court.

A. Jacobs vs Levi Oren, appeal from
Benton county, was argued and sub-
mitted before a full bench today.

J. Fred Yates and A. L. McFadden
attorney for respondent W. S. Hufford
attorney for appellant. This action
was commenced in justice court. No.
9 Benton county, for \$15, rent and was
tried by a jury and a verdict in favor
of the defendant and judgment en-
tered thereon in favor of the defend-
ant for \$41.65 from which judgment
an appeal was duly taken to the cir-
cuit court.

This cause came on for trial and re-
sulted in a verdict for defendant.
Plaintiff then filed a motion for judg-
ment for \$2.50 notwithstanding the
verdict of the jury which was over-
ruled and the verdict set aside by the
court on November 17, 1893 which
time the defendant filed on a motion
to amend his answer which was
allowed by the court. That
on April 10, 1894, the cause was tried
again by jury which resulted in a
verdict for the plaintiff,
in the sum of \$2.50 and the plaintiff
thereupon filed a motion for judg-
ment upon the verdict for \$2.50 and
the costs and disbursements of this
action which was allowed by the
court and judgment rendered accord-
ingly.
