All high grade specialties and indescribable dances are promised for Friday evening, but it seems Salem is not even stuck on Vanderville. The outlook for continuance of good entertainments this winter is not the best unless our people turn out better. At least no theatre trains will be run to Salem for the present, but it is to be hoped Patton Bros. will not lose heart and reduce the capital city to ten and fifteen cent shows with \$5.00 cash prizes or schooners thrown in.

CANNERYMEN

Talk About the Outlook for the Fishing Business.

Mr. Frank M. Warren of Warren, at the Canaries of the Columbia, and Mr. Seuter of The Dalles were in the city today and talked discouragingly about the outlook for the salmon cannery business for 1897.

Mr. Warren said: "The outlook is not so good as a year ago for disposing of cannery stock. There is not much prospect of a strike, but prices for fish will not be over four cents. The Alaska output is increasing, one trouble between the cannerymen and fishermen on the Columbia have driven capital off the river more and more and increased the output from Alaska where they have no interruptions from strikes not many fisheries can be worked at four cents unless labor is cheaper.

The gentlemen represent the largest cannery interests on the upper Columbia and are in the city on matters connected with their business.

Auditing of State Claims.

Secretary of State Kincaid has expressed himself as willing to do anything lawful lying within his power to assist state creditors in realizing on their claims where his action would not be adverse to the state's interest. There has been an offer to buy state claims at par, if audited, so they may bear the legal rate of interest. There is an unreviewed opinion of the supreme court, however, which says that the secretary of state cannot audit claims for which no appropriation has been made. Eminent legal authorities say the opinion is not sound. It is said the secretary may audit claims before an appropriation has been provided, though he is not authorized to issue warrants therefor. The matter can be tested by mandamus proceedings. Suit to compel the secretary to audit could be brought on an agreed claim, and thus test the authority of the secretary of state in the matter.

Lawyer in Paris.

Mr. William H. Lawler, manager of the mining company bearing his name, operating at Andium, Linn county, is in Paris, France, where for several weeks he has been undergoing treatment for his eyes. The latest reports received are that his right eye will have its sight fully restored, but the left will probably be bereft of sight. Mr. Lawler has been kept in a dark room for several weeks, attended only by his surgeon, trained nurses and Mrs. Lawler, but it is expected that he will soon be released from confinement. The treatment he underwent was a heroic one, but it was the only means left to preserve his sight, and the fact that the operation has proved partly successful is a source of great satisfaction to his family and friends.

COOPER.—At the home of his parents, on the Garden road, Saturday, March 27, 1897, Erroll Cooper, aged 4 years, of scarlet fever. The funeral was held at 10 a. m. Sunday.

WEST.—At the family home, corner of Ferry and Twentieth streets, at 5:30 a. m. Monday, March 29, 1897, Mrs. J. W. West, aged 35 years. The maiden name of the deceased was Sarah Jane Boddyfelt and she was born in Marion County Iowa, on August 3, 1861. In the following year accompanied by her parents, she crossed the plains with an ox team settling in Tillamook County where she lived for seventeen years.

On July 4, 1882 she was married to J. W. West and at once went to Portland, where they resided about two years after which they came to Salem where Mr. West has been engaged in the butcher business.

The husband and two little boys survive the deceased. The mother and a sister, of the deceased, reside in Tillamook county.

On October 16 Mrs. West was taken ill with pleurisy and when almost well was afflicted with a gripe, from which she suffered a relapse. About a month ago she was stricken with typhoid fever, from which she was not able to recover.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Central chapel at 2 p. m., Tuesday, Revs. Beauchamp and P. S. Knight, officiating. The remains will be interred in the City View cemetery.

SENTENCE COMMUTED.—Gov. Lord today commuted the sentence, of Loren Parker who was sentenced for seven and one-half years for manslaughter, from Harney county. He had served about three years, and the commutation comes on recommendation of the trial judge. Mr. Parker has started for eastern Oregon.

SCHOOL-CLERK

Deadlock Remains Unbroken

Board of Directors Again Fail to Elect a Clerk.

The board of school directors for district No. 24, met in adjourned session at 10 a. m. today, but failed to elect a clerk to succeed Mr. Bozorth. It was expected that the chairman of the board, Mr. E. M. Waite, who is visiting in California, would have returned and would be in attendance, when it was anticipated that the deadlock on the election of school clerk would be broken. But Mr. Waite has not yet returned and when the meeting was called to order the following quartette responded to roll call: Messrs. Osmart, Bruce, Johnson and Cluerington.
