The Portland Fruitgrowers' Union, with a capital of \$1,000, divided into 50 shares of \$20 each, filed incorporation papers in the secretary of state's office. The incorporators are J. F. Jaeger and R. W. Henneman.

The case of R. L. Sabin, respondent, vs. N. L. Wilkins, F. M. Johnson, Mary A. Williams and D. A. Osborn, appellants, from Benton county, was argued and submitted in the supreme court.

The First M. E. church of McMinnville has filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state. A. S. MacAllister, of The Dalles, was commissioned a notary public today.

STARR IS BOUND OVER.—As a result of the preliminary examination of Frank Starr before Recorder Ed M. Edes Tuesday afternoon on the charge of larceny from a dwelling, that gentleman was bound over to await the action of the grand jury in the sum of \$250 in default of which he was remanded to the care of Sheriff F. T. Wrightman Deputy Prosecuting attorney J. H. McNary appeared for the state and Wm. Kaiser appeared for the defendant. In the course of the trial, Mrs. Livermore, from whom the money was stolen, made the statement that she had kept boarders during the winter some of whom were in attendance at the legislature. When counsel for the defendant heard this statement he thought he could readily account for the disappearance of the \$90. But he was informed that the boarders were not members of the late lamented legislative body. The counsel for the defendant also became rather inquisitive in cross-examination Chief of Police Dilley, one of the state witnesses. It seems Mr. Dilley happened in a saloon on Saturday, where Starr was spending money quite freely, and politely refused an invitation to drink with the defendant. This statement surprised Mr. Kaiser considerably but those acquainted with the veracity of the general Chief of Police do not question the statement in the least.

E. H. FLAGG ELECTED.

A Compromise Is Effected and the Deadlock Finally Broken.

The school clerk deadlock that has existed with the board of school directors for district No. 24, for several weeks, has finally been broken. At last evening's session a compromise was effected on Mr. E. H. Flagg, the well known printer of this city.

At 7:30 o'clock last evening, Messrs. Johnson, Ohmart, Bruce and Cherrington, comprising the school board with the exception of Mr. E. M. Waite, who is in California, met in adjourned session. Six ballots were taken without success electing a clerk. Messrs. E. H. Flagg and Scott Bozorth receiving two votes each on each ballot.

Previous to taking the seventh ballot, one of the directors who had been supporting Mr. Bozorth, made a few remarks reviewing the situation and indicating his willingness and desire to see the deadlock broken and the board put on a fair working basis. The seventh and last ballot was then cast resulting in the election of Mr. Flagg, that gentleman having received three of the four votes cast.

Upon motion of Director H. A. Johnson the bond for school clerk was fixed at \$20,000 after which adjournment was had.

BOND APPROVED.

The board of directors held a short business session this morning at which time Mr. Flagg's bond for \$20,000 with J. H. Albert and L. L. Patterson, as sureties, was approved and accepted. The clerk-elect was then "sworn-in" and immediately assumed the duties of that office.

GOOD SELECTION.

The protracted balloting for school clerk was brought to a close by election of E. H. Flagg. The selection is likely to prove a good one. Mr. Flagg possesses the qualifications to fill the office. He is intelligent, temperate, industrious, and a friend of public education. He has a home and a business at Salem, and a hard-working man, who in an unpretentious and independent manner performs the duties of citizenship and supports his family. The schoolboard is to be congratulated on eliminating politics from school managements. It should cut no figure.
