THE SALEM POST OFFICE

Will Be the Finest Between Portland
and San Francisco.

Postoffice Inspector J. C. F. Gor-
don, of Portland, was in the city for
a few hours today. Everything per-
taining to the removal of the post-
office has been determined upon ex-
cept as to the exact date.
The furniture etc, for furnishing
the new office has been ordered from
the east and will consist of some
choice articles. Provision has been
made for 250 lock-boxes and
22 drawers. In the present office
there are over 300 boxes but as only
about 200 of these are rented, it
was not deemed necessary to order
but 250 boxes for the new office. The
furniture will consist of the best of
material and will be arranged for the
accommodation of the employees.
Mr. Gordon when seen this morning
stated regarding the new postoffice
when it was ready for occupancy "That
it will be the finest between Portland
and San Francisco." This is Mr.
Gordon's last trip to Salem until the
time arrives for removing to the new
quarters when he expects to be in Sa-
lem and assist in the removal.
The new postoffice with its elegant
furnishings will be a credit to the city
and will be equally appreciated by the
postoffice officials as well as the gen-
eral public. The new location will do
very nicely until our national law
makers see fit to give us a government
building.

List of Institutions Whose "Claims" May Not Be Filed.

The question of what are bonafide
claims against the state continues to
agitate the public. Quite a number
of duplicates of filed claims have been
hypothesized and others have been
placed as collaterals at 75 per cent.

MORE ABOUT WARRENTS.
The general order has been observed
that where there is a state official
elected by the people or a superintendent
of a public institution or depart-
ment created by law performing a
necessary public service, or where a
board of officials has charge of an in-
stitution, to file the claims against
the state and issue a duplicate if de-
manded.

The list below, with a few excep-
tions, are not being allowed to file
claims, as their object is to get such
claims on file as a leverage against
the state through the next legisla-
ture. Mr. Kincaid does not consider
that they have bonafide claims that
he must file.

The claim of the Pilot Commission
at Astoria was returned today with-
out filing, as that office was not filled
by the legislature nor elected by the
people. The question as to whether
there is a vacancy is the same as in
the Game Warden, the Food Commis-
sioner, the State Librarian and other
unfilled places.

In the matter of clerical aid for the
state superintendent's office it seems
impossible to conduct that depart-
ment, according to law, without cler-
ical aid. The secretary of state can-
not well refuse to file claims for cler-
ical service any more than he can in
the treasurer's office, where a clerk is
needed.

The state librarian is also a neces-
sary official, for if he is not paid the
governor would have to appoint some
one to look after the library, and he
would have to be paid.

The domestic animal commission
and state board of equalization are
created by law, and their compensa-
tion fixed, and have power to audit
their own claims. They will probably
be allowed to file them. The others
will be contested.

COMMUTED.

The sentence of Israel Gregg has
been commuted from 20 to 5 years.
Gregg was sent up from Clatsop in
1893, for the crime of rape. His term
will expire next year. The commuta-
tion was made upon the recommenda-
tion of the trial judge, who says that
Gregg was guilty of a statutory crime,
but not of forcible assault.

FOR FLAX FIBRE.

Mrs. Lord is working to get the flax
industry started against all possible
obstacles. Yesterday the Oregon
Woman's Flax Fibre association filed
new articles of incorporation in the
office of the secretary of state. The
purpose of the corporation is to grow
flax and other vegetable fibres, and to
deal in the same, and in the seed, and

raw and manufactured products
thereof. The capital stock is fixed at
\$5,000, divided into 500 shares of the
par value of \$10 each. The principal
place of business is given as Portland.
The incorporators are as before, Mrs.
Juliet Lord, Mrs. Jane C. Card, Mrs.
L. W. Sutton, Mrs. G. M. Pittcock and
Miss H. E. Felling.

This incorporation is expected to
absorb the business of the Oregon
Woman's Flax and Hemp Fibre as-
sociation, which was capitalized for
\$10,000, and filed articles on March 17,
1897, with four of the above named
ladies as incorporators.

In Probate Court.

Jennie B. LaLond, administratrix
of the estate of Thomas LaLond, de-
ceased, has filed her semi-annual ac-
count with the county clerk.

The inventory and appraisal in the
estate of F. B. Mize deceased,
has been filed with the county clerk.
The aggregate valuation of the prop-
erty is \$536.50. The appraisers were
F. B. Southwick, Jesse Macey and
John Chase.

An Expensive Drunk.

L. Tobriner, salesman for Haber,
Davis & Co. who have been conduct-
ing the auction sale of clothing, etc.,
at E. C. Small's old stand, will leave
Salem much poorer in purse than he
anticipated but will have an almost
inexhaustible supply of experience.
The sale was concluded and the goods
all packed and shipped by Thursday
afternoon and Tobriner proposed to
celebrate his departure from this city
by getting on a drunk. He was soon
badly intoxicated. About 1:30 o'clock
this morning while standing opposite
E. F. Osburn's racket store, the intox-
icated man deliberately discharged a
revolver, the bullet shattering a large
\$90 plate glass front in Mr. Osburn's
place of business. Officers Gibson
and Gamble, who were drawn thither
by the explosion, took their man in
charge and landed him in the county
jail.

Tobriner appeared in police court
this afternoon and settled the case.
The affair cost Mr. Tobriner nearly
\$125.
