ON THE WILLAMETTE.

O. C. T. Co., Changes Its Schedule—Boat Movements.

Commencing this morning the O. C. T. company adopts a new schedule. The steamer Altona will leave Salem on Monday's, Wednesday's, and Friday's at 7:45 a. m. on Sundays at 10 a. m. connecting with the Ramona at Mission Landing. The steamer Ramona has been removed from the Independence-Portland run and will hereafter ply between Oregon City and Portland. Speaking of the operation of the schedule, a Portland paper contains the following:

"The Oregon City Transportation Company will resume business on the Oregon City-Portland route Monday morning, running the steamer Ramona three round trips a day with passenger fares just half what they formerly were—25 cents for the round trip. While the officers of the company disavow any intention of beginning a war on the East Side trolley line, the two transportation companies will be in direct competition for all kinds of business between Oregon City and Portland, and can hardly avoid conflict. It is understood that the operation of the trolley freight cars as an unwarranted invasion of business territory that properly belonged to the river freighters. That was the situation when the boats pulled off the Oregon City run and went on the upper Willamette three and one-half years ago. The return to this route with the big reduction of fares promises a lively fight for business. Merchants of the town look with disfavor upon such competitions, for cheaper rates mean that more trade will go to the metropolis."

The O. R. & N. Co's. gauge at Salem indicates the stage of the river to be about 9 feet above low water mark.

The O. C. & E. Company steamer Albany has established a schedule on the river and operates between Corvallis and Portland. The company's dock, recently constructed at the foot of State street is now being used by the boat.

SCHOOL REPORTS.

Following reports of county Superintendent's have been filed at the State Superintendent's office. By W. J. Moore, Lakeview, Lake county. Males 458, females 395, total 823. Average teachers' salary male \$53.09, female \$40.80. The outlook for schools is better, and greater demand for first grade teachers.

Gus Newberry, Phoenix, Jackson county: Males 2434, females 2674, total 5108. Salary male \$38, female \$31. W. J. Peddicord, Wasco, Sherman county: Male \$510, female \$519, total 1029. Salary, male \$40.25, female \$36.22. He advocated the free text book system and writes a very interesting report in the space for remarks.

H. G. Starkweather, Oregon City, Clackamas county: males 3931, females 3779, total 7710. Wages male \$38.80, female \$33.25. The county school levy is 7.07 mills. He reports the sentiment in favor of popular education gaining ground.

State of Oregon, respondent vs. An drew Robinson, appellant; appeal from Marion county; judgment affirmed, Opinion by Bean, J.

R. W. Getty, respondent vs. Kate F. Ames et al appellants; appeal from Coos county, judgment affirmed. Opinion by Bean, J.

Francis Pratt, respondent, vs. H. C. Wilson, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; judgment of the lower court affirmed; opinion by Bean, J. M. E. McElvain, plaintiff, vs. W. L. Bradshaw, circuit judge et al., defendants; mandamus proceedings dismissed opinion by Bean J.

Coos Bay, R. & E. R. & N. Co. appellant, vs. J. H. Nosler, respondent; appeal from Coos county; judgment reversed and a new trial ordered. Opinion by Wolverson, J.

Already Recorder Ed N. Egan and Chief of Police Dille have taken possession of their cozy quarters on the ground floor.

The Salem Water company has rented a couple of rooms on the second floor into which they will remove by May 1st. The rooms were originally intended for the offices of the city treasurer and city surveyor. They are located to the right of the east entrance and are directly opposite the council chamber.

It will probably be May 1st, before the Salem fire department can occupy its new quarters from the fact that the cement approaches to the department's quarters have not yet been constructed.

Chief Hutton and the fire boys will no doubt greatly appreciate their new and spacious quarters.
