FLOODS.

The High Water Receding. All Danger Over at St. Paul. Water Rising at Vicksburg.

ST. PAUL, April 8.—The waters began to recede at St. Paul Tuesday night, and fears of a break in the levee are at an end. Not a pound of ice remains in Staple & King's ice houses and the loss will be a great inconvenience to killing operations this summer, necessitating the hauling of ice from the city.

Working Hard.

JACKSON, Miss., April 7.—A Vicksburg dispatch says: The rise here is increasing, owing to the overflow from the delta, and from this date the fight to save the Louisiana levee begins. It will be made with the utmost resolution.

Commissioners of the fifth Louisiana district met in special session and resolved to borrow \$30,000 for the campaign. They are promised \$10,000 by the government, besides material.

The Missouri.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 8.—The river has reached 20.1 feet, within three inches of the danger line. The flood is coming on slowly and serious damage is predicted to property along the flats before Friday noon.

At St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, April 8.—Clear and cool weather prevails, and the river, which stands at 26.7 feet, shows a decline of two-tenths for the past twenty-four hours. A decline of two-tenths is shown at Hannibal, while at Keokuk a rise of one-tenth is registered. At Kansas City a rise of 1.3 feet is registered.

U. P. Sale Correspondence.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—The attorney general sent to the state, copies of additional correspondence relating to the agreement made by the government in the matter of the sale of the Union Pacific railroad. Among the letters and telegrams included is a telegram from E. Ellery Anderson, government director of the road, to Attorney-General Harmon, recommending the acceptance of a bid of \$1,500,000, made by the reorganization committee.

License.

PORTLAND, Or., April 8.—The council yesterday afternoon passed an ordinance licensing nicker-in-the-slot machines. The license is fixed at \$5 per quarter.

GREECE

Now Displays Great Skill. The Warning of the Powers Not Heeded—Clamoring for War

LONDON, April 8.—The LATISSA correspondent of the Times says: After visiting the frontier posts, I am convinced the Greeks are showing plenty of strategical skill in disposing of their army and overcoming difficulties on the frontier. It is clear that they are relying upon rapid movements in the field, particularly artillery movements. They seem to disregard the moral value of strongly entrenched positions, on which the Ottomans lay great stress. If they are once passed, Thessaly will be at the mercy of the invading Turkish forces. All hangs for Greece on the possibility that a rising in Macedonia will occupy the attention of the Turks. The Hellenic missionaries have neglected no opportunity to arm the peasantry.

Little Effect.

ATHENS, April 8.—The identical notes delivered by the representatives of the powers to M. Skouzes, have had little effect. The newspapers today declare that they are really of no practical value in rendering the issue more certain, because Greece is aware that the agreement between the powers is quite factious. A complete calm characterized the city yesterday although many placards have been posted, advocating war. This evening the military patrols paraded the principal streets. The evening newspapers censure the clamor for war.

Russia's Proposal.

ATHENS, April 8.—It is rumored that Russia has made a separate proposal to the effect that if Greece will withdraw her troops from Crete, Russia will agree to obtain the withdrawal of the Turkish troops from Crete, and Russia will promise that Prince George of Greece will be sent to organize the Cretan gendarmes. Greece, according to report, promptly rejected these propositions. The demand made that Admiral Canavaro, the Italian officer in command of the international fleet in Cretan waters, be relieved of his command, is said here to be due to his opposition to the plan drawn up for the blockade of the Piraeus.

Throughout yesterday evening the palaces of King George and Crown Prince Constantine were blazing with lights, and the city generally was a mass of illumination in celebration of the anniversary of Greek independence in 1821. Displays of fireworks were numerous, and in all parts of Athens were patriotic assemblages. The speakers being greeted with cheers for the king and for war. During the evening there was a grand military tattoo, in which all the bands in the city took part. The whole population thronged the streets, cheering everybody and everything and for war with the Turks.

Fighting.

CANEA, April 8.—Brisk fighting took place outside of Candia. The insurgents, in considerable strength, advanced from four points and attacked the Turkish outposts. The latter maintained their positions with the loss of two men killed and eleven wounded.

CANEA, April 8.—Fire has broken out at Candia.

BY ORDER OF COURT.

Assignee of the J. M. Moyer & Co. Stock Forced to Sell.

PORTLAND, April 1.—By order of the circuit court Ben Selling, assignee of the \$75,000 Moyer woolen mill cloth stock, has put the uniform suits that were held in pledge by the Bank of Columbia onto the market at \$8.50. These all wool dark blue navy suits were never sold at Portland before for less than \$12 to \$16.

CUBA.

Clemency Promised Rivera. The Insurgent Leader's Life Will Probably Be Spared.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—Secretary of State Sherman stated that he had assurances that General Rivera, the insurgent leader, would not be executed but would be treated as a prisoner of war. General Rivera was captured after being wounded in a recent battle, and it was feared for a time that he would be executed by the Spanish authorities for his participation in the rebellion.

Surrendered.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., April 8.—General Jui Sang, i y and Colonel La Chuga, hearing that warrants had been issued for their apprehension on the charge of aiding and abetting a Cuban expedition, surrendered themselves this afternoon to the United States officers. They were taken before United States Commissioner Egan, and their hearing continued to Saturday.

In Danger.

NEW YORK, April 8.—A World special from Havana says:

An American who has just returned from Havana says General Gomez, April 4, was on a sugar estate west of Sagua. The general spent four days there. All the force he had was 400 picked men. One league away, at Rodrigo, there was a Spanish column of 800 men, and at Santo Domingo, three leagues away, was a body of 2000 Spaniards.

Weyler's Movements.

HAVANA, April 8.—Captain-General Weyler, accompanied by his chief of staff, Colonel Escorial, and Dr. Martiñez, arrived at Tunas early this morning and proceeded in the direction of Cienfuegos.
