CHANGE IN SCHEDULE.—The Willamette river at Salem has been gradually raising for several days. The continued warm weather has melted a great deal of snow in the mountains which has caused a perceptible rise in the river. The O. R. & N. Co's gauge today registered 11 1/2 feet above low water mark. The steamer Altona leaves Salem on Sundays at 7:45 a. m. hereafter instead of 10 a. m. By this change the Altona goes to Oregon City and return the same day, this allowing the Raunona to make regular trips between Portland and Oregon City on Sunday as during the week.

Pendleton E. O.—The appointment by Governor Lord of Judge Charles B. Bellinger, of Portland, as regent of the state university is an excellent selection.

Denver Times: The North American Review for April contains on its title page the question, "What Will Bring Prosperity?" Immediately following this is "Antarctic Exploration." This answer to the question is probably as good as any.

The X Ray man is still planting potatoes and hoping for prosperity. It may come in two or three years. Salem has seen her ups and downs before. But this is a little unusual and prolonged. Usually there has been a spring impulse to business, factories starting and all business picking up. But that is all absent this year.

Paris has sold to a syndicate the right to build 45 miles of railways in the streets of that city, the company paying \$40,000,000 for the privilege. At the end of 35 years the whole property shall go to the city. The company will be allowed to charge from 2 to 4 cents a ride and the proceeds thereof are expected to reimburse them profitable.

Col. Jim Eddy of the Oregon Railroad-Commission has bought the Roseburg Plaidealer and makes it say:

The secretary of state is reported by the Salem JOURNAL as being home "from" Eugene. The JOURNAL man has the "from" in the wrong place. The secretary should be reported as in Salem from his home in Eugene. A man's home is where his family resides. The constitution requires the secretary of state to reside at Salem. Our secretary of state doesn't care a rap about the constitution unless it suits his purpose.

See here, Mr. Eddy: You ought to get on a broader basis. All the state officials hold their voting residence in the counties they come from and also have a residence at Salem.

The matter of withholding part of the pensions of old soldiers at the soldier's home, is explained thus:

The pensions of old soldiers are hedged about by laws with all sorts of safe guards, in order to ensure to the pensioner, as far as possible, the enjoyment of his pension. When next pension day comes, Commandant Byars at the home will turn over the pension money that comes into his hands for the inmates. He will take no chances on breaking any law of congress. Then the recipient of such pension will be expected, under the ruling of the board, to give up the same, except \$4 per month. Falling in this they must leave the home. There are old soldiers outside of the home who have no pensions who would like to get in. Several were turned away last year because of lack of room.

A Deserved Pension.

WASHINGTON, D. C. April 16.—A pension has been granted to the minors of Newell White, of Salem, Marion county.

These children have been mothered by Mrs. Mary Mariels of South Salem, who has been appointed their guardian. For many years, Mrs. Mariels herself was a widow, has cared for these children in addition to her own. The pension dates back about three years, and has now come to these orphans at a time when it will help clothe and educate them. The testimony in the case was only completed by the most diligent research of their attorney, Capt. D. C. Sherman, and the pension has been finally granted at the urgent importunity of Senator McBride, who also deserves great credit. Mrs. Mariels has still pending and hopes to secure the original claim for her husband, John Mariels, who served all through the war but died from injuries received in the service. These claims are both perfectly just and legal and there is no good reason for their having been so long delayed.
