Easter Services.

Easter Sunday was generally observed by all of Salem's church denominations. The rain almost invariably comes on this day did not disappoint any one yesterday, but put in an appearance about 5 o'clock in the afternoon and continued in a heavy downpour until an early hour this morning. While the rain was certainly needed and did much good, yet the average Oregonian dreads to think of the seven stormy Sundays to follow.

St. Paul's Episcopal church was not of sufficient dimensions to accommodate the immense crowd that assembled there in the morning to attend the Easter services. The exercises were especially good, the singing by the choir of young folks was a feature of the service. The address by Rev. W. B. Mapton was an eloquent one and in harmony with the occasion. The solo "The Birthday of a King," as sung by Prof. H. A. Heritage, was a beautiful story of the birth of the child Jesus and the Christmas quartette in the selection "In Memoriam" never sang any better. Thirty-two members of De Molay Commandery, Knights Templars, attended the services in a body and made a splendid showing in their uniforms.

The Sunday school of the First Methodist church held exercises in the evening. A program consisting of choruses by the school, recitations and dialogues by the students was presented. The choir under the direction of Prof. Heritage rendered two beautiful anthems while the professor also sang a solo entitled "The Birthday of a King."

As excellent program was presented at the Presbyterian church in the evening. The anthem by the choir is deserving of special mention. Miss Nellie Brown very skillfully rendered a violin solo. The selection "Hark, Hark My Soul" by the ladies' quartette, consisting of Mrs. Ella B. McDowell, Mrs. F. A. Wiggins, Mrs. F. G. Davis and Miss Woodie, was a rich treat to the duet "Forever With The Lord" by Mrs. McDowell and Mrs. F. A. Wiggins, was sung very beautifully. The address by the pastor, Rev. Steele, on "Music and Religion" was an especially practical one in which the relation of one to another was clearly presented.
