The "Eugene Guard" continues to pitch into President Chapman, whom it evidently wants to get rid of as president of the university. The people of other localities of the state are not losing much sleep over Prof. Chapman's supposed delinquencies, if he in fact be guilty of any, but are content that he shall remain at his post unless he is unfit for the position, or has committed some act of misconduct that disqualifies him for further usefulness at the university. We are afraid the heat lately generated against professor is of local quality and therefore not liable to affect outsiders with its warmth. These state schools seem to be hotbeds of envious cabals that are really injuring their usefulness and prestige. The people of the localities in which they are situated are apt to think that they own them and ought to have the management and direction of their affairs. They want a majority of the regents residents of their town, and seem to look upon outside appointments as of doubtful propriety, unless the appointee is of docile temper and accommodating disposition. It is thought by some of the regents that Prof. Chapman has been a little too much devoted to local interests, and especially so when he established the high school connection with the university, at the expense of the taxpayers, for the special benefit of Eugene. We do not say this in any unkind spirit against Eugene, whose people we like and whose interests we wish advanced, but call attention to the matter as a mitigating circumstance for the consideration of President Chapman's local critics. Then, too, there are said to be one or two professors who think a vacancy in the presidential chair would furnish a pleasant seat for them and tend to allay and dissipate local strife and contentions. We outsiders believe that Professor Chapman is an educated man, a trifle egotistical and unpractical, of superior qualifications as a teacher of the higher branches of learning, and anxious to make the institution successful. We believe, if he would confine himself strictly to his duties and reform the course of study at the university, he would make friends for the institution, as well as for himself, and better the condition of education for the state.

We do not think that the argument as to the amount of taxes he pays is of any account. The case is certainly not exceptional, and is doubtless easily explained, notwithstanding his large salary. It may be that the professor has contracted debts for his education that he has been and is discharging, or that he has extra burdens on his purse from members of his family that are old or have met with misfortunes. There may be explanations from other causes, alike creditable to his sense of duty or charity, to account for want of assessable property. We do not think it is nice to make these charges against anyone, unless there is some foundation in fact to show an attempt to escape his just proportions of the public bur-

dens. The most serious charge we have heard against President Chapman is that he was a bimetalist prior to his becoming the owner of some national bank stock, and ever since he has been an ardent advocate of the single gold standard.

Greater men than he have turned over on this money question from freer silver men to goldbugs to protect personal interests. But for an educator and a scientific man to abandon convictions or "change principles" is a serious matter. Honest money is an economic proposition, a scientific fact, and bimetalism has the unqualified endorsement of the greatest men of science in the old and new world. But it seems the moment a man's income gets to a certain proportion, his principles, unless firm as Gibraltar, are liable to be swayed by the influences that fatten his pocketbook.

We could forgive President Chapman's want of dignity and sagacity in intermingling with local affairs; we could defend him as a man of great learning and ability; as an educator; we can admire what he has done to build up the university; but we cannot excuse or forgive a change of heart from the double standard to the single standard, or vice versa on the money question, if the change was influenced by any personal interest or pecuniary consideration.

Oregon State Fair.

The Oregon State Fair for 1897, opened on Thursday, September 30, and closes on Friday, October 8. The books are now open for entries for the following stake races, the entries closing on May 1.

TROTTING STAKES.
For 2-year olds, mile heats, 2 in 3, for colts owned in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and British Columbia prior to January 1, 1897. Entrance \$25, payable \$5, May 1, 1897, \$10, July 1, 1897, and \$10 before starting. Added money \$150.

For 3-year olds, mile heats, 250 class, 3 in 5, conditions same as for 2-year olds. \$250 added.

No added money for walk overs.

FIVE-EIGHTH MILE DASH for 2-year olds, owned in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and British Columbia prior to January 1, 1897. Entrance \$25, payable \$5, May 1, 1897, \$10, July 1, 1897, and \$10 before starting. Added money \$150.

For 3-year olds, one mile, conditions same as for 2-year olds, \$25 entrance. \$200 added.

No added money for walk overs.

There must be three legitimate starters in these stakes to carry added money. If less than three, the entrance money will be divided 65 per cent to first, and 35 per cent to second colt.

Other races will be published later.
