TURN-OVER

Of Taxes for the Year 1896.

The Days' Transactions at "Old Marion's" Capitol.

This morning Sheriff F. T. Wrightman made a payment of 1896 taxes to County Treasurer G. L. Brown. The amount of today's payment which is the fifth turnover of last year's taxes thus far, is \$19,965.73. The five payments made, aggregate \$24,433.11.

ORDER

For the Oregon Flax Fibre.

Seed to Arrive Today and Preparations for Seeding.

Oregon has a flax climate. Oregon is a flax state. Oregon has a governor's wife who is a flax woman to the core.

Mrs. Lord was put into the seventh heaven of happiness over the success of the enterprise nearest her heart by receiving the first order for flax fibre. A German linen manufacturer has placed the first order for 1000 pounds of the Oregon fibre as soon as it can be put on the cars.

THE SEED READY.

Mrs. Lord received the bill of lading today for 200 bushels of fibre seed from Washington, which will be in Salem today or tomorrow ready for distribution. A practical flax grower from Washington is to be in Salem in a few days to give instruction in sowing the crop.

Farmers who have not done so can make contracts to get seed and instructions as to making the crop at the Dickinson seed store. Seeding can be done as late as the tenth or the middle of May. But the soil must now be got ready and kept ready to put in the seed in good shape.
