The senior has evidently learned that there is still another wart in the university and that at least one department of that institution can exist without his assistance in the capacity of presiding officer.

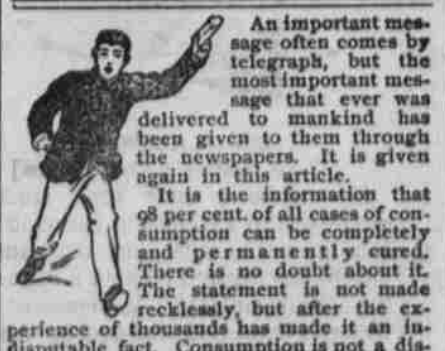
