STATE HOUSE NEWS

Ralph Moody has been at Salem to institute mandamus proceedings against the secretary of state to enforce the auditing of state claims.

The annual report of County School Superintendent Armstrong, of Multnomah county, has been received at the office of the superintendent of public instruction. It is the most complete report yet received. Gilliam county is yet to be heard from.

The will of Baron Otto von Bose-lager, deceased, has been admitted to probate in Marion county. Benedict Gottwald is named as executor and the Beneficent order, of Mt. Angel, beneficiary. The estate is estimated at \$5,000.

Herbert Baynes was brought to the asylum from Baker county. Ellen Hendricks, of Lane county, was discharged.

Musical Comedy.

Dalley's Comedians undertook to present a musical comedy Friday evening at Reed's—"A Nutmeg Match"—without music—that is without orchestral accompaniment. This was to attempt the absurd under conditions bordering on the impossible. For some time there has been friction between the opera house managers and the local orchestral leaders, and up to last night the difficulty had not been bridged. The only first violin player who can conduct an orchestra at present is Mr. Carlyle Denton, and the probability is that Mr. Denton or some one else will conduct the music tonight when the same company will undertake to present Hoyt's farce comedy, "A Bunch of Keys," a well known play. It is to be hoped the audience will be provided with music, as that much is certain, no theatre company however excellent—and the Dalley's are an excellent troupe—can play well to a cold dead house with out an orchestra. The people should remember that unless the opera house is to be closed up altogether an attendance must be guaranteed sufficient to pay the expenses of a good company occasionally and a good orchestra always. They owe this to the Patton Bros. and to the city, as a city of this size without an opera house and orchestra would be an anomaly of civilization. The presentation last night was not without merit. The leading actors are well known stars of the San Francisco and New York stages—Miss Lottie Williams, May Nannery, Esther Moore, Mabel Matland, the contortion dancer, Messrs. E. J. Herron, E. F. Smith, Carl Berch, Al. H. Hallet, Ed. F. Nannery, and the entire company is as well provided in talent and scenic equipment as any that comes to Salem. They came here direct from Frisco, and will dedicate the reconstructed Cordray at Portland. Salem owes such a company an audience.
