BURIED.

Alderman Simpson's Funeral

Was Largely Attended Sunday--I. O. O. F. and W. of the W.

Funeral services over the remains of Alderman Chas. H. Simpson were conducted Sunday afternoon from his late residence on East Court street. The funeral was one of the largest attended ever held in our city, a high tribute of respect to an honored and esteemed resident of our city. Members of Salem camp No. 118, W. of the W., and Chemeketa Lodge, I. O. O. F., of which orders the deceased was a member, were in attendance, there being fully seventy-five members from each of the orders.

Sunday morning the remains were taken from the home of the deceased to that of his aged parents where the mother viewed the remains of her son. The scene was most affecting.

Funeral services were held from the late residence at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Rev. J. Bowersox, pastor of the First United Evangelical church of this city officiated at the residence, delivering a short address.

The funeral cortege left the residence shortly after 3 o'clock. The members of the Woodmen and I. O. O. F. lodges together with several hundred of the friends of the deceased boarded the fire street cars that had been provided for the occasion. A large number were unable to go to the cemetery owing to the lack of room in the cars.

At the grave the Woodmen took charge of the remains and, having given their impressive burial service, the I. O. O. F. followed with their ceremony and the remains were deposited in the Odd Fellows cemetery.

The attendance at the cemetery was noticeably larger than at the house, several going directly to the cemetery, knowing the residence would be uncomfortably crowded.

The pall-bearers were chosen equally from the two lodges, of which he was a member, three from each the Woodmen and the I. O. O. F. They were as follows: Woodmen—George U. Ashby, John West and Schuyler Kightlinger; I. O. O. F.—Thos. Holman, Frank Waters and Fred Erickson. The vacancy in the Salem city council, occasioned by the death of Mr. Simpson, will be filled by appointment by the mayor, as provided for in the city's statutes.

STATE HOUSE NEWS

The supreme court will not hear any more cases at Salem till after the Pendleton term is concluded.

The 29th Oregon supreme court report has been out for some time but the department of state reports only a few sales. The attorneys either do not know that the report is out or money is a little scarce with them. The state prints and sells these reports at about actual cost.

E. B. Ryan who was appointed a commissioner of deeds for Oregon some time ago by his excellency Gov. Lord, today filed the required oath of office and is now an authorized commissioner of the state in San Francisco.

Gardner Fones of the State house grounds has a good crop of hay on the northwest part of the campus. A visitor was this morning figuring on how much to the acre it would yield.

A document received at the state house contains the names, addresses and occupation of the 30 McKinley electors of New York elected at the recent election. In the entire 30 there was not a farmer or laborer or producer.

The change in the S. P. trains will make the mails an hour later in the morning for the state house people. They have been getting their mail about 8 o'clock in the morning and will now not get it before 9.

Gravelotte Mining Company, James M. Stevenson, C. A. Schilbrede and D. T. Stafford, of Roseburg, incorporators, filed articles of incorporation today with a present capital stock of three millions and power to increase to ten million at pleasure.

In the absence of her husband, who is ill, Mrs. Geo. Irwin, is filling the chair of assistant state superintendent of schools.

Chemawa Wins.

In the match game of base ball Saturday between the pines from the Chemawa Indian Training school and the Salem team the former won, the score standing 32 to 16 in its favor.

The defeat of the Salem team is attributed to lack of practice, having been organized scarcely a week previous to the game. The Indian boys were in fine condition and "played ball" in a manner that exhibited on their part a thorough understanding of the game. Several hundred Salemites witnessed the game and were highly interested. A return game is to be played on the same grounds on Saturday afternoon May 15th, when the local team hopes to be able to reduce the score considerably. Saturday's game was only the first of numerous games to be played during the season. In Justice Court.

The suit of Louise McKakinney vs. Mary E. Fraizer before Justice Johnson today is a rather uncommon proceeding. February 6, 1897, plaintiff secured a judgment for \$108 and \$47.20 costs against Mrs. Mary E. Fraizer, for whom she formerly worked. On execution being issued property amounting to \$31 was sold under execution, and \$132 remains still due. This proceeding is brought to discover whether Mrs. Fraizer has any more property subject to execution by Holmes and Kellogg, W. M. Kaiser defending Mrs. Fraizer. The taking of testimony on interrogations has occupied most of the attention of the court today, the evidence being taken down short-hand by Mrs. Scott, the stenographer.

At 3 o'clock the case was settled and dismissed upon payment by defendant of enough to satisfy plaintiff.
