

Chief among our exports just now seems to be gold. The Dingley bill is not yet in force.

The "protection" which was to have been given American tax raisers, in the Dingley bill, has been withdrawn and tax is to go on the free list.

An Exchange says: Senator McBride has introduced a bill to permit final proof on public lands to be made before any officer qualified to administer oaths in homestead cases, whether the lands are in the county where final proof is made or not.

It is reported that the Oregon delegation in congress has recommended Prof. H. B. Miller, president of the State Agricultural College at Corvallis, for a diplomatic appointment to Germany. He might be able to teach the Germans how to make sauer kraut, but as a president of a college he seems a failure.—Prineville Review.

Last year the United States imported \$73,064,000 worth of sugar, which produced a revenue of \$29,001,906. The tariff bill now pending will raise the revenue, it is said, to \$51,963,906, on the same amount of imports, the increase of duty being from 41 to over 71 per cent.

The gold standard Portland Welcomes says: The Oregonian much conceives, and hence has frequently misstated, the sound money popular strength. Probably 2,000,000, certainly at least 1,000,000 voters who don't believe in the gold standard voted for McKinley because they were determined to vote for protection.

Strangers visiting New York for the Grant celebration were astonished at the cleanliness of the city streets. The conditions that greeted them were simply the visible results of a system under which public money appropriated for street cleaning is actually devoted to that purpose.—Mail and Express.

Poor, despised Populist Kansas is becoming again a favorite with the eastern money loaners, and money on good farm loans is going rapidly. This has been the result of the economic action of the state legislature, and the confidence inspired that economy and sound government are assured from the control of the state by the people.—Exchange.

The Pendleton Tribune (Rep.) says: "A tariff on hides will improve the value of American cattle." No, not any more than it would "improve" their eyesight or hornlength. It would add to the profits of the big meat monopolists: that is all. But the shoe manufacturers seem to have a stronger "pull" than the meat trust. The farmer isn't considered any more than a fence-rail would be.—Portland Welcome.

Reading exchanges convinces one that some legislation ought to be had to prevent horses from running away with milk wagons. This has come to be a frequent occurrence to the great damage of milk cans, spilling of milk and occasional skinning the nose of a milkman. The old saying that it is useless to cry over spilled milk does not remedy the evil, and legislation is needed to relieve the milk peddlers from destructive runaways. At the Dalles the other day two horses ran with a milk wagon and struck a telephone pole, coming to such a sudden standstill that the proprietor, milk cans and everything else were scattered over the ground. The horses when last seen were pursuing their milky way.

Rev John MacLaren (Rev. Dr. John Watson) the author of a number of Scottish novels, in which the milk of human kindness flows rather freely, is to be tried for heresy by the Presbyterian church. The doctrine of a personal devil and the need of insurance against his schemes he rudely shocks. His latest book, "The Mind of the Master," is especially offensive to theologians, because it sets the Savior

out in the lovely colors of a friend of humanity. Of course Mr. Watson is making capital out of the situation and says: "The Synod would undoubtedly be glad to have me recant and end the matter. This I will never do, but I will fight to the bitter end."

Mr. Leonard O. Simmons has put down a good sidewalk, grading the lot to the grade of the street, and then in addition he has built a substantial crosswalk. It is made of heavy plank, four feet wide and spiked to heavy crosspieces. On each side he has buttressed it with broken rock so that in winter the customary chuckholes will be absent.

We mention this because the work has all been well done, and done voluntarily. It is not only a good improvement to the Simmons property, but an improvement to the whole street. South Commercial street could be made one of the most slightly elevated in the city. Its gentle elevation and natural drainage, with more men and women who feel and do like Simmons, Bayne and Hall it would soon be a beautiful boulevard.

Oregon as a state has no debt, but its cities and counties owe something which a financial paper lists at these figures: Portland's bonded debt on January 1, 1897, was \$4,922,070 including the water debt of \$3,150,000; floating debt, \$173,000—making a total city debt of \$5,095,070. This does not include the port of Portland's debt of \$310,000. Astoria's debt is given at \$416,050; that of Coquille, \$16,800; Heppner, \$20,000, Klamath county, \$70,000; Lake county, \$42,034; Medford, \$33,000, Multnomah county, \$176,967, (less sinking fund of \$87,550); Oregon City \$64,600; Salem, \$183,160; The Dalles, \$160,000. There are smaller towns that owe something and some of the counties are paying interest.

The Callsays it is made by a request of Free Silver Republicans for a state convention to determine their relations to the other bimetallic organizations of Iowa under the recent anti-fusion law of the state legislature, and to reorganize the Free Silver Republican state central committee, to elect delegates to the Chicago meeting June 8, 1897, and to act on any other subjects presented germane to the accomplishment of American bimetallicism. It is understood that Chairman Griffin will shortly call a Minnesota conference for the same purpose. The union conference in Oregon is to be held at Albany, June 2. THE JOURNAL publishes the news about these movements and trusts good may result from these conferences, but is not over-sanguine about results.

But as neither would be profitable let us cultivate the potato patch. Nearly every body has one or ought to have, and slaughtering dog fennel is of more importance than killing Turks to our readers. How to slaughter the dog fennel without doing harm to the growing crop of the delicious tubers is the problem. We are not going into the merits of hill-culture—though we are as bigoted a convert to the latter as can be. But if you don't want small potatoes and a few in a hill, we urge you to cultivate carefully as soon as the sprouts are visible. The secret is this: Very soon after the sprouts appear above the soil the little hairlike roots strike out just below the surface of the soil. By the time the potatoes are six inches high these feeders penetrate the soil by the thousand in all directions and it weeds close to the stalks are not killed early, removing them or cultivating close cuts them off and disturbs the most important process of growth. BROWN. He of Mattie Overman Fame

Accepts a Call to Green Street Congregational Church, Chicago.

At the semi-annual meeting of the Dubuque Congregational Association of Ministers and Laymen, held at Bellevue, Iowa, the case of Rev. C. O. Brown, late of San Francisco, was disposed of. Six months ago at Strawberry Point, Iowa, the above named association, after a stormy session voted to receive Rev. Brown into this association, and some time afterwards the Bay State association of San Francisco made a request through a resolution that this association rescind its action.

At the Bellevue meeting this resolution was brought up and discussed and finally put to a vote, which resulted in its being tabled by a vote of 14 to 3. Rev. C. O. Brown was present and made a request for dismissal and recommendation to the Green Street Congregational church, of Chicago, where he has received a call to preach. He received fourteen votes for dismissal and recommendation, several present not voting.

This probably ends the case so far as Dubuque, Ia., Congregationalists are concerned, and the reverend gentleman, who has been a central figure in scandals in San Francisco which are still fresh in the minds of the public, will now become the pastor of what is known as the Green Street Congregational church in Chicago, in which city he has resided since leaving San Francisco last fall. The church is a small one in the outer part of the city.

Rev. Brown returned from Bellevue with the Dubuque delegation, and after spending a few days here will return to Chicago. He has passed through a trying ordeal the past year, during the progress of his long trial in San Francisco and as a result he has grown quite gray, besides showing other signs of the physical strain upon him.

A Bellevue special says: By unanimous consent Dr. Brown occupied the first hour of its afternoon session speaking to a question of privilege. He reviewed the circumstances under which evil reports against him gained currency on the Pacific coast, showing that several powerful classes of enemies, whose malice he had aroused in the discharge of his duty, including the saloon element and anarchists, were ready at any expense to help in the work of ruining him. He showed that the man who led the opposition in the Bay conference was notoriously his enemy in an entirely different matter before he entered the council or took the matter into the conference.

He reviewed the offer of fellowship from Dubuque association and the efforts of those who have sought to stultify Dubuque association by attempting to lead it to withdraw their offer affirming that such a course would be infamous between individuals, and declared that his removal from the Pacific coast had been influenced by this proffer. He closed by thanking the association that by an almost unanimous vote it had refused such a course and stood loyally by its first action. Dr. John Blanchard, of Chicago, also spoke, referring to recent correspondence with the committee of Bay conference.
