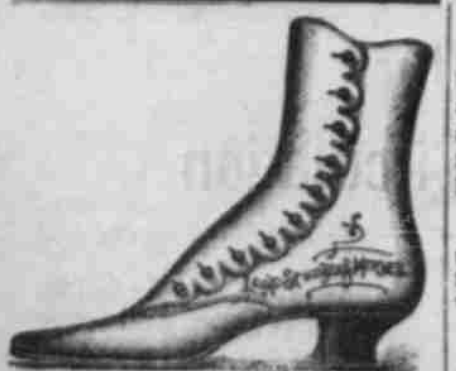

About the Trains and the Street Cars.
Acting on the suggestion of a JOUR-
NAL reader, the following informa-
tion regarding the movements of the
trains and street cars in this city has
been compiled and arranged in a read-
able style. It may prove instructive
to a great many of our readers who
are not thoroughly acquainted with
the operation of the cars. The north-
bound California overland reaches
Salem at 7:10 a. m. for which a street
car leaves the Willamette hotel at
6:45 o'clock. The south-bound Rose-
burg local arrives in the city at 11 a.
m. as formerly, and the car leaves
the hotel at 10:40 a. m. before. The
north-bound Roseburg mail reaches
this city at 2 o'clock now, being 20
minutes earlier than before, and in
order to make this train the car
leaves the hotel at 1:40 p. m. The
south-bound California overland
reaches Salem at 8:30 p. m., and is
met at the depot by a car that leaves
the hotel at 8:05 p. m.

It might be well to mention that a
new schedule has gone into operation
over the "little line" whereby thirty
minute cars are making regular trips.
The cars pass on the switch on State
street near the Methodist church at
the hours and the half hours.
