## GREECO-TURKISH.

### Pharsala Taken By Turks.

#### Unspeakable Turk Has Spoken Most Emphatically.

LARISSA, May 7.—A dispatch from Pharsala says:

A Turkish corps appeared on the summit of Mount Tekke yesterday morning. Securing a formidable entrenched position on the hillside, they attacked the fourth regiment of Evzones about noon. The latter made a strong resistance, but were finally compelled to fall slowly back. The Turks then cannonaded and destroyed the village of Ordskinalwof, which is about two hours march north of Pharsala.

The crown prince, having ordered the army to draw up in line of battle, the Greeks advanced about 2 p. m. The Turks, numbering about 30,000 men, immediately descended the slopes of Mount Tekke and planted their batteries which began to bombard the Greek regiments. Owing to the superiority of weights, the Turkish cannon inflicted heavy losses upon the Greeks, especially near the station.

The Turks continued to advance until they had come into close quarters and then the crown prince decided to retire to more commanding positions.

All ammunition and supplies have been transported to Domokos, on the heights of which the Greek batteries were prepared for action. The Turks have burned the village of Tatal, and have massacred the priest and his entire family, in the village of Dioskani.

### THE BEGINNING OF THE END.

LONDON, May 7.—Evidently it was Edhem Pasha's ability to cut in between the two Greek armies which led to the speedy retreats that are the beginning of the end. The Greek accounts say that both retreats were orderly, but such news comes only from official sources in Athens, which are notoriously unreliable. It is just possible that, so far from being orderly, they may both have retreated in a panic, as was the case at Larissa.

Edhem Pasha will almost certainly follow, to prevent General Smolenski from rejoining the main army.

In any event, General Smolenski is now cut off from all chance of embarking on the Greek vessels at Volo. He must either surrender to the Turks or endeavor to reach Lamia by the difficult mountain paths.

The situation now indicates that Greece will be compelled to sue for peace in order to save the remnant of her army from destruction. The absence of Greek cavalry at Pharsala, left the Greeks in complete ignorance of the movements of the Turks, and it is another illustration of the general incompetency of the Greek staff.

General Smolenski has admitted, himself, that long habits of guerrilla warfare have made the Greek helpless against modern military strategy.

It is now believed that the end would have come much sooner but for the difficulty the Turks have experienced in bringing adequate supplies of ammunition for magazine rifles and modern artillery over the mountain passes.

### WILL BE ORDERED TO CEASE.

ATHENS, May 7.—A collective note will be handed to the Greek and Turkish governments, today, calling upon them to cease hostilities, on the distinct assurance that the powers will undertake the final solution of the pending difficulties.

Austria and Germany have joined the other powers in proposing mediation between Greece and Turkey.

Sir Ellis Ashmead-Bartlett, whose schooner was detained by the Greek fleet on the assumption that papers found on board of her after his interviews with the Turks were of a compromising character, arrived tonight. He was met at Piræus by M. Ralli, the premier, who conducted him to the British legation, and requested Mr.

Egerton, the British minister, not to allow him to leave the legation before quitting Athens, in order to prevent a demonstration.

It has been decided to send Colonel Vassos to Thessaly, and Colonel Styatos, with a new general staff, will replace Colonel Manos in Epirus. Major Constantinides will be sent to Domokos.

Two transport vessels have been sent to Volo to remove the few remaining inhabitants. The ammunition stores and food supplies have already been taken to Stylos.

### EUROPEAN CABLES.

Cretans are anxious to fight and 5,000 men have asked for means of transportation to land.

A Pretoria dispatch states that the Boer government has given in and repealed the obnoxious immigration law.

A London dispatch from Cape Town says the army reserve for the colony has been notified to hold in readiness for active service.

Fighting is proceeding at Velesino. The Turks have captured and burned two villages.

A Greek battalion at Philippina attacked the Turks near Philippina. Their ammunition soon gave out and had to retire.

The powers have decided to land troops at Athens to protect King George. Greece having declined the proffered mediation and Turkey willing to settle on easy terms.

The Greeks vacated Pharsala before daylight and a majority of the forces are retreating on Domokos.

The Greek army is at Domokos and awaits the Turkish army. General Smolenski is at Vestino to protect Volo. A communication with Pharsala has been cut off. Later General Smolenski will act in conjunction with the Greek fleet to protect Volo or may later retreat to Almyro with a view possibly of effecting a conjunction with the main body of the Greek army.

The losses at Pharsalos to the Greek forces was fully 1000 while the Turks lost 6000 killed and wounded.

Specials from Athens says Prince Constantine has occupied an entrenched position Domokos dominating the plain. Greece is willing for an armistice say the latest cables.

It has been authoritatively announced that the powers have proposed mediation.

### An Expensive Coin.

On Saturday some bamboo-peddlers were in Salem exchanging their wares for old jewelry. At the home of the Patton brothers Grandma Cooke obligingly turned over some old trinkets for some bamboo.

Among the articles was a kind of medal that resembled a brass button, but in reality was an original "beaver" gold coin of the mintage of 1849, worth at least \$25, but in reality so rare as to have no price in the market. The peddlers got away with the article and were not hauled up until they reached Independence where Banker Hirschberg recovered the coin and notified the Pattons, who today secured the return of their coin. It is a relic of pioneer days, a precious heirloom of their fathers'. It is now worth about \$50.

### May Day.

The old fashioned May day festivities were kept up at Lincoln public school, the children choosing a May Queen in three rooms as follows: Mr. Hall's room, Lou Armstrong; Mrs. Hall's room, Winnie Wain; Miss Bradshaw's room, Tonie McCauley. Each of the queens had her maids of honor. The rooms were beautifully decorated with flowers and programs of music, and recitations were rendered all these "fixins and doins" being in charge of the children themselves. For once the teachers took seats with the spectators and the children played teacher. There were many visitors present.

FOR LARCENY.—D. J. Lightner was arraigned before Recorder Edes Thursday charged with larceny. He was held under \$250 bonds for appearance Monday, May 10th. Lightner resides near Jefferson, and is accused of stealing a number of farm tools. D'Arcy & Richardson are counsel for the defendant.

## CONGRESSIONAL.

### Cleveland's Order Revoked

#### Other Matters of Interest From the Seat of Government.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—The senate today agreed to an amendment to the sundry civil bill revoking the order of President Cleveland, made on February 21st last, establishing forest reservations aggregating 17,000,000 acres. The debate brought out much criticism of Mr. Cleveland's order, Senators Pettigrew, Wilson, Turner, Rawlins and White speaking against him. Gray, of Delaware, defended the course of the president, pointing out that it was the result of an inquiry authorized by congress and conducted by the national academy of sciences.

Allison endeavored to have the amendment restricted so as to leave the question of revocation to the president, but he was defeated on a yeas and nays vote, 14 to 33. Gorman made a point of order against the amendment, but this being submitted to the senate, was defeated 23 to 52. The amendment was then agreed to without division.

Another amendment agreed to provides for the continuance of the investigation of the condition of the fur seals in Behring sea.

The sundry civil bill was passed late in the day. It carries appropriations aggregating \$53,000,000.

The house, by a strict party vote, all the Republicans favoring and all the Democrats and Populists opposing, adopted a resolution providing that the house meet only on Mondays and Thursdays until otherwise ordered. It was announced that it would be the Republican policy to wait on the senate's action on the tariff bill.

Bailey, Democrat, of Texas, made a strong but unsuccessful fight to have the order modified so as to give early and full consideration to the bankruptcy bill. The Republicans replied that they would call the bankruptcy bill and hold daily sessions on it after General Henderson's return, but until then the rule should stand.

War—Lieutenant-Colonel E. Miles, First Infantry, to be colonel; Major W. H. L. Bisbee, Eight Infantry, to be lieutenant-colonel; Captain Benjamin H. Rogers, Thirtieth Infantry, to be major; First Lieutenant J. Goe, Thirtieth Infantry, to be captain.

INVENTORY.—C. O. Pelland, M. Wampole and H. Fickens, appraisers, today filed with the county clerk an inventory of the estate of E. J. Harding, deceased. It shows the estate, real and personal, to be valued at \$36,400.

TAX EXTENSION.—The county court has extended the time when taxes become delinquent to June 10.
