APPORTIONMENT

To Marion County Schools.
County Supt. G. W. Jones Makes
Semi-Annual Distribution.

Today County Superintendent G. W. Jones made the first semi-annual apportionment for 1897, of money to the districts of the county. The total amount to be distributed is \$20,955 of which amount each district receives \$50 and \$1.50 per capita for each person of school age in the district. Those districts that have a balance on hand over and above expenses, the same amount will revert to the county or in other words be deducted from their share of the apportionment.

The warrants were drawn this afternoon and will be mailed to the respective districts tomorrow.

District No. 24, Salem, contains 2,810 pupils and its apportionment amounts to \$4,265.

A NOTABLE EVENT.

Herr Von Rengarten Addresses Some German Friends.

Sunday afternoon about fifty of Salem's German speaking population greeted the great traveler, Herr Const. von Rengarten, at Prof. Winkler's studio. The gentleman is a Russian nobleman and is making a tour of the world on foot. His object is to secure information and experiences for magazine articles, and ultimately for a book which he proposes to publish.

At the instance of Prof. Winkler, who is a German scholar of rare accomplishments as well as a musician, the traveler favored his German friends with a brief review of his trip. He dwelt principally upon Persia and its terrible conditions, describing the country as well as its people and their abominable customs and traits. Between their superstitions, ignorance and all lack of morality Herr Rengarten considers them about the lowest race on the globe. In Persia he says all women, and girls from 10 years up, are absolute slaves, while the male part of the inhabitants are lazy, filthy, vile barbarians.

This of course refers to the common people. The Persian prisons are veritable hells, where the government takes no responsibility except to incarcerate the victims.

The only food prisoners receive is what is brought in by compassionate inhabitants. They are not only chained, but must sleep in stocks in gangs of six. Their cemeteries consist of walled pits, where the bodies are thrown for vultures to devour.

In speaking of Russia and Siberia later the gentleman says most of the exiles for criminal and political offenses live in freedom among the farmers of Siberia, and are angels compared with the barbarous musketeers to the south. These exile convicts are mostly educated, warm-hearted fellows, and give a traveler the best of entertainment. The invasion of East Russia by the great railroad he says is having dire effects. The natives he says who were a quiet, inoffensive set of people, are not improving with modern innovations. They are largely falling a prey to drunkenness. Whisky is sold at five rubles per gallon, four of which is for internal revenue, and the government is encouraging its consumption in order to keep up its finances. The speaker visited a town of 3000 inhabitants and found not over 150 sober persons, the place being strewn with bearded, maulin specimens of humanity.

Herr von Rengarten speaks in the highest terms of the Americans, by whom he says he has been treated most nobly. He considers this the ideal country of the world, and thinks seriously of making his home here after completing his tour. He says he is everywhere received most hospitably, and says this is the only country where he has not at some time been jeered and insulted for his foreign habits and costume. Wherever he has come in contact with Americans even though he could not speak their language, he has been royally received and treated as a cultured person deserves.

He is taking a deep interest in the American Indian, and was deeply impressed by the magnanimity of the government upon visiting the Chemawa school, where he was shown all its workings by Supt. Potter. While there he made a few remarks to the school, which were interpreted by Prof. Winkler, and greatly enjoyed. He expressed especial regard for all American institutions, and to illustrate referred to the Indian school. He says it is difficult for a European to realize how a gentleman like Superintendent Potter can so nearly place himself on equality with the pupils and employees, and have their absolute respect and co-operation without manifesting his superior authority upon every occasion. He also visited the institute for the blind, and was delighted with Superintendent Carter's work. In this connection the gentleman suggested to the JOURNAL that he would like to commend one thing the Japs. are doing for their blind. They have on the suggestion of Dr. Edmund Nauman, of Berlin, added a department to train pupils in the massage treatment that has grown so popular the world over. The blind are not only competent to do this work, but their lack of sight makes them especially desirable to patients.

The writer, has digressed from the points of the talk given at the studio, and very reluctantly brings the report to a close. Prof. Winkler, in behalf of the company, heartily thanked Herr von Rengarten for his most interesting talk, and took advantage of the opportunity to suggest the formation of a German society or club for literary or social improvement. His suggestion met with general approval and it was decided to take the matter up early in the fall. All present felt grateful to Prof. Winkler for the opportunity to hear the distinguished traveler's address.

BRIDGE!

Repaired By the Counties.
But the City Ought Not Be Compelled to Pay a Cent.

The city of Salem is to pay part of the expense of maintaining the steel bridge at Salem. Is this right? The bridge was built by the two counties and the city donated \$20,000 toward the enterprise. The counties own the bridge according to law. The bridge after it was built was to be owned and operated and controlled by the two counties in common. Moreover there has been litigation on this point in controversy. Huffman, Bates & Co. did not sue the city, but the two counties for a balance of \$22,000. They were defeated, and brought suit in the federal courts, suing Marion county alone and were again defeated, and for the reason that the counties could not be held for extra work. The city never entered into the matter and never could be held for a cent for construction or repairs then, nor can it lawfully be held now.

It may be that the only way to get immediate repairs is for the city to undertake the repairs. But the city should not pay one-third.

As the city of Salem pays a large share of the county tax, to pay one-third of the expense is really to pay one-half or more of the keeping up of a bridge that belongs to two counties.

"Keep Off the Grass."

Notwithstanding the fact that in a number of places on the lawn about the city hall are posted notices which read "Keep off the grass," some persons are determined to pay no attention whatever to the notices. A fine clover lawn has been started and been receiving the best of care. Last night some willfully malicious person crossed the lawn in a number of places, badly disfiguring the general appearance thereof. And that the miscreant might make matters worse he walked along the outer edge of the cement walk, alternately stepping upon the lawn. Such proceedings certainly do not show much regard on the part of the perpetrators to the reasonable requests that may be made of them. Should they be detected, the parties should be severely dealt with that it might serve as a lesson to others.

A GRIM GUEST.—H. G. Sonnemman, the State street grocer, this morning opened some bananas, and upon taking out the bunch was faced by a deadly foe, who could not talk, but had blood in his visage. It was a young tarantula and he showed his teeth and disposition, but failed to bite his victim. Mr. Sonnemman has him caged and invites all to come and see this terror of the tropics.
