Mexico the Garden of Eden.

At the Unitarian church Sunday evening Dr. W. E. Copeland in a lecture on the "Prehistoric Races of America," demonstrated quite clearly that the Garden of Eden was not in Asia but probably in Central America, Mexico or the sunken continent Atlantis. Mr. Copeland spoke particularly of the Maya civilization and their bible which is much older than the Christian bible and contains many beautiful teachings and many stories and fables similar to those told in the bible. The learned doctor explained about the sunken continent Atlantis; how the Greek philosopher Plato wrote of it and how the Maya traditions tell of the gradual sinking of the Atlantic ocean and their emigrations to the west. The hieroglyphics of Egypt and of Central America are identical and are read by the same key or Rosetta Stone and are both proven to be at least 35,000 years old, showing that at a very remote period a high civilization existed in America. This higher civilization came from the east via sunken continent Atlantis. Mr. Copeland admits that the later American Indians and savage tribes prebably came to America via Bering sea and from Asia, but denies that higher civilization came in this way. Mr. Copeland's lecture was exceedingly interesting and covered the best opinions of the closest students and most learned investigators of the present day.

Grecian Architecture.

Prof. F. S. Dunn delivered the last of his series of lectures on the "Seven Wonders of the World" at the university chapel last evening, before a large assemblage. The speaker had to condense the four remaining subjects into one evening's lecture, a fact that was regretted by his auditors who had become thoroughly interested in the subjects under discussion. "The Colossus at Rhodes," "The Mausoleum," "The Pharos," and "Olympian Zeus" were all discussed last evening. The three former subjects were briefly referred to, the major portion of the lecture being on the "Olympian Zeus." Prof. Dunn is an extremely interesting speaker, and last evening in relating the facts and interesting details of mythology, connected with this wonderful monument of Grecian architecture, held the closest attention of his hearers. It is only hoped that the professor may decide to present a similar series of lectures during next winter.

ORATORIAL CONTEST.

To Be Participated in by Colleges of the Northwest.

The northwest intercollegiate oratorical contest will be held in Portland on Saturday the 15 inst. There will be representatives in attendance from the colleges of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and a very interesting contest is anticipated.

A recent number of the U. of O. Monthly, published at Eugene, contained the following pertaining to the coming contest:

"The colleges of Washington recently challenged the Oregon Oratorical association to an oratorical contest in which the winners in the two states should contest for inter-state honors. The association has been empowered to arrange for this meeting, Pacific college alone objecting, and arrangements will be made for the contest. The colleges of Idaho have been invited to send an orator and thus make the contest more interesting. Delegates from the various states will meet and form an inter state association by which annual contests will be held for the winners of the state contests. The first contest will be held in Portland about the end of the college year and the representative for Oregon will be Mr. Fred Fisk of the U. of O. A project similar to this was considered by the presidents of the colleges of the three states, but was not carried out. The contests as managed by the students will create more interest in oratory, although the prize may be smaller.

"Last year Mr. H. S. Templeton of the U. of O. won the first prize of a hundred and fifty dollars offered by the King County, Washington, Bar association, in a contest at Seattle in which the colleges of Oregon, Washington and Idaho were represented."

AT THE COURT HOUSE.

Insane Man Sent to the Asylum—Teachers' Examination.

E. P. Hicks, aged 45 years, a native of Iowa, but a resident of Silverton, Or., was today committed to the insane asylum. The man imagines that he is being pursued and fears that he be attacked. For some time he has carried a revolver for protection. In the absence of County Judge G. P. Terrell, who is in Portland, the examination was conducted before Justice H. A. Johnson, by Drs. Richardson and E. A. Pierce and District Attorney S. L. Hayden.

The second quarterly teachers' examination for 1897 for Marion county will be held tomorrow and the remainder of the week. Owing to the confusion occasioned by alterations being made at the court house the examination will be conducted at the Unitarian church, corner of Cottage and Chemeketa streets, as was the last one. A number of the members of the graduating class of the Salem public schools, contemplate taking the examination.

A marriage license was today issued to Samuel Penter and Jane Shaw. The groom-elect who is nearing the three score and ten year mark was in a most jovial frame of mind when he applied for the "glory ticket" today and neither was apparent anxiety satisfied until he gained possession of the necessary document that made the happy union of the couple possible.

STATE HOUSE NEWS.

A. C. Housman has been brought to the asylum from Brownsville. He is 23 years old.

J. Flester, W. B. Flester and Ed Eustad have arrived at the penitentiary, under sentence from Josephine county. Each is about 21 years old, and is convicted of the crime of stealing bacon. Judge Hanna gave Eustad 18 months, J. Flester 19 months, and W. B. Flester two years.

Al Moy, sentenced to five years for rape, has been received from Multnomah county.

John E. McDowell was restored to citizenship. The restoration was granted upon the petition of a large number of citizens of Lane county. McDowell is a young man, and served in the penitentiary for forgery.

Day Observance at Salem.

Committees at Work to Prepare a Big Program.

The committees are composed of Dr. B. H. Bradshaw, R. A. Crossan, J. Q. Barnes, D. C. Sherman and J. M. Pugh, on the part of Sedgwick Post, and Mrs. Lou Smith, Mrs. Lucinda Burton and Mrs. D. W. Matthews of the Relief Corps.

Invitations have been sent out to the various orders, military organizations and schools to participate. Memorial Day will be observed in a fitting manner at the Capital city. There will be a grand parade to the cemeteries, at 1 p. m., Monday, May 31, and an elaborate program at 8 p. m., at Reed's opera house. The committees should meet with a hearty response and a cordial co-operation from the people of Salem.

Of course all the graves of soldiers will be decorated, but as usual the special services will be at the Memorial lot in the City View cemetery. Hard work should be done between now and May 31 to put the cemeteries and streets leading thereto, into first class condition.
