AN INTERESTING SESSION.

Students of the Blind School Discuss Higher Education.

The first annual session, of the Oregon National College association for the blind, convened at the state blind school on Church street, last evening. There was a good attendance and the interest manifested on the part of the students in obtaining for themselves higher education than that afforded them at present, could but arouse the interest of outsiders.

In the absence of the president, Roy H. Kaitz, first vice-president, opened the convention with a short address, in which he set forth the object of the meeting. A general discussion of the best means to be pursued in securing further education of the blind, followed.

The reports of the officers of the association having been received, Supt. T. L. Carter, of the school, read two interesting papers from students of the school now located elsewhere. The first was written by W. F. Hogan, entitled "Hope the Star of Inspiration." Miss Hattie Carruthers, of Albany, was the author of the paper, the subject of which was "Why Not the Best." Both papers dealt in general with higher education, but in particular to the education of the blind. Miss Sadie Bristow read an excellent paper on "The Importance of Education" while Miss Etta Skeels also contributed a good paper.

Adjournment was then taken until 2:30 this afternoon. The final session of the convention will be held at 8 o'clock this evening.

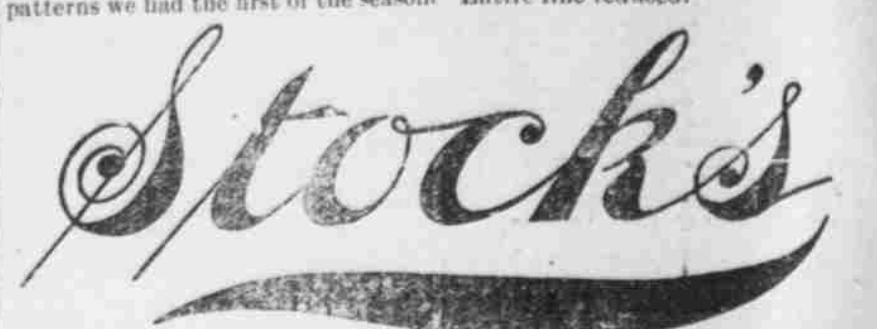
