THE CONVENTION ADJOURNED.

Will Meet in Salem in 1898.—Some Resolutions Adopted.

Convention of the Oregon National College Association for the Blind held its closing sessions Saturday afternoon and evening when equally as much spirit and enthusiasm was exhibited on the part of the students as at the opening session. Several valuable and suggestive papers were read along the line of organization after which officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: R. H. Kaitz, of Portland, president; George Price, Dallas, first vice-president; Jane Dickinson, Albany, second vice-president; Miss Etta Steele, Medford, recording secretary; Miss Sadie Gristow, Nashville, corresponding secretary; Wilbur F. Hogan, Waddill, Missouri, assistant corresponding secretary; Mrs. Elvira Renfrew, Eugene, treasurer.

The following resolutions were adopted by the convention:

Whereas, The need of facilities for the higher culture of the blind is generally felt, and

Whereas, The aim toward which our associations are all working is one—this being higher education of the blind, and

Whereas, We feel the great importance of perfect harmony and more intimate relations among the co-workers in our common cause.

Therefore, It is resolved: 1. That we believe in the higher education of the blind, and that the government both should and will furnish means for the same.

2. That, while we favor the annex policy, we concur with the interstate convention in the resolution passed last October deferring all matters of difference as to methods, to the future; and work, for the present, only for the higher education of the blind.

3. That we suggest that the constitution to be adopted by the national association shall specify more intimate relations between the national and state associations than said constitution, in its present form, indicates.

4. That a committee of three be appointed before the close of the convention to make any necessary changes in our constitution to agree with that of the national association, after the policy of the latter shall have been fully determined; and that this committee report at our next annual convention.

5. That we extend to the interstate convention to convene at St. Louis, October next, a most cordial greeting, assuring them co-operation and sympathy in our common cause.

The above resolutions were adopted and the association adjourned to meet again on April 16, 1897, at Salem. About twenty of the blind people, of Oregon, were present at the above meeting.

WILL MOVE SATURDAY.—Postmaster B. F. Bonham, has received a letter from Chief Inspector Robt. R. Munro, of San Francisco, stating that Inspector Gordon, has been transferred to Washington, D. C. and hence could not come to Salem to receive the new office. Mr. Munro, says he will be at Salem June 1, when he hopes to find the Salem postmaster comfortably settled in the new quarters. Mr. Bonham now proposes to move next Saturday.

NEW FERRY BOAT.—Mr. Hall, of Hall's ferry, launched the hull to his new ferry and will soon have it completed. This will be the best ferry boat on the Willamette river. By the way, the road from Hall's ferry to Salem is one of the finest pieces of roads in Marion county and is perfectly drained.

A FISTIC ENCOUNTER.—James Parker was arraigned before Justice H. A. Johnson, this morning, charged with assault and battery on the person of Sid Brodie. He pleaded guilty to the charge and was fined, which he promptly paid and went his way rejoicing.
