## BURGLARY.

### The State vs Thatcher Trial.

### Termination of the Justice Court Litigation.

In the case of state vs. Thatcher,  
Jos. Aiken was sworn. Objection  
was made to introduction of cash  
book. Objection. Defendant claims,  
said Council Knight for the state, to  
have been acting under direction of  
Nye; before the latter left he refused  
to make settlement and tore pages  
out of the cash book, and tried to  
conceal the business transactions of  
which he had contracted to divide up  
the proceeds, but had sent this man  
to feloniously and wrongfully break  
in, and sneak through the slime and  
mud of Salem's back alleys to get  
what he had no legal right to claim  
or take.

Counsel D'Arcy (P. H.) tried to  
show that the business difference be-  
tween Wagner and Nye had no proper  
relation to this trial of Thatcher for  
burglary. The objection was over-  
ruled. Aiken identified book. Took  
down copy of daily receipts to see how  
the last legislature compared in its ex-  
penditures for liquor with preceding  
legislatures.

Witness read from a pocket mem-  
orandum which he had made from the  
cash book in the drawer. Made the  
copy for his own information. The  
figures were as follows:

Receipts for Saturday January 9th,  
\$93.10.

For Sunday, January 10th, \$39.75.

By weeks the receipts were as fol-  
lows: \$380.45, \$302.25, \$295.45, \$417.70,  
\$341.25, \$456.70, \$205.05.

Total receipts for two months, end-  
ing March 15, 1897, \$2,501.70.

Nye made a 6 months balance sheet  
to Wagner, showing total receipts of  
\$175.95. This was a total shortage of  
\$1440.55.

Mr. Wagner, Mr. Harritt, Mr. Klet,  
Jos. Aiken and Attorney-General C.  
M. Idleman testified on behalf of the  
prosecution and Thatcher, the defend-  
ant, and W. J. D'Arcy were called by  
Messrs. D'Arcy.

At the conclusion of the arguments  
by counsel Justice Johnson announced  
that he would take the matter under  
advisement until 1 o'clock Tuesday  
morning.

### THATCHER DISCHARGED.

Justice Johnson rendered a decision  
at 11 o'clock sharp, finding that there  
was not sufficient evidence to bind  
defendant over to the grand jury.

### DIED.

SETTLE.—At the home of Willard  
Woods, near Wheatland, Or., of  
heart failure, William Clarence Set-  
tle, aged 19 years, 4 months and 13  
days.

Burial took place at Hopewell cen-  
tery. The remains will be removed  
in the near future to Lebanon ceme-  
tery. He was a graduate of the Sal-  
em public schools also had nearly  
completed a course at the Capital busi-  
ness college, and a member of the  
Christian Church.

He was sick for nearly two months  
with typhoid fever and heart trouble,  
from which he died May 11th. He  
was beloved by all and well known in  
Salem. The bereaved family have  
the sympathy of the entire neighbor-  
hood, who deeply mourn the loss of  
this hopeful young man.

BERRY.—In this city, Sunday, May  
16, 1897, Rose A., wife of B. F.  
Berry, aged 50 years and 1 month,  
of spinal trouble.

Deceased was born in New York, on  
April 16, 1847, and has resided in Ore-  
gon for about 6 years, coming here  
from Nebraska.

The remains were taken from  
Ollinger & Rigdon's undertaking parlors  
at 10:30 o'clock this morning to  
City View cemetery, where brief ser-  
vices were conducted by Rev. W. C.  
Kantner after which they were in-  
terred.

## MEETING OF SCHOOL BOARD.

Considerable Routine Business Disposed  
Of.—Wood Contracts Made

At the regular meeting of the board  
of directors for school district No. 24,  
held last evening, considerable busi-  
ness was transacted.

The teachers' and janitors' pay roll,  
for the month ending May 17, amount-  
ing to \$2,053.50, was ordered paid by  
warrants.

City Superintendent Geo. A. Peebles  
submitted his monthly report, which  
indicated a slight falling off in atten-  
dance, and this is reasonably accounted  
for by the prevalence of epidemic  
diseases, such as measles, diphtheria,  
etc. In the matter of school popula-  
tion it is noted, during the month,  
that twenty pupils have moved from  
the district and fourteen entered and  
registered.

The action of Chairman Waite in  
the settlement of the C. F. Mize tax  
claim in the sum of \$18.25 was offi-  
cially approved.

Monday, May 31, the day following  
Decoration day which falls on Sun-  
day this year, was declared a legal  
holiday for the schools of the district  
upon the request of City Supt. Peebles.

An order was made by the board,  
instructing all the teachers desiring  
re-employment to file their applica-  
tion for such positions in due season.

Director Ohmart was authorized to  
take such steps as he deemed neces-  
sary to protect the newly planted  
trees on the Lincoln school grounds.

Janitors were ordered to notify  
citizens against allowing their cattle  
to trespass on school grounds.

The board granted County Supt.,  
Geo. W. Jones, the use of the East  
school for county institutes and other  
educational meetings over which he  
might preside. The following resolu-  
tion pertaining to the institutes was  
adopted unanimously:

"Resolved, That it is the sense of  
this board that all teachers connected  
with the Salem public schools, if pos-  
sible to do so, attend the daily ses-  
sion of the Marion county institute to  
be held the week following the close of  
the Schools."
