mercial street.

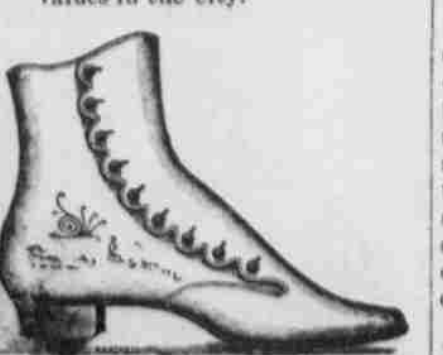
Miss Edith Winstanley has begun

Memorial Day.

The Memorial sermon will be
preached at Unity church by Rev. W.
E. Copeland, at 10:30 a. m., Sunday,
May 30. All old soldiers, whether
members of the Post or not, sailors
and marines are invited to attend.

Decoration day will be on Monday,
May 31, and the parade is expected to
start promptly at 1 o'clock p. m., and
old soldiers, sailors and marines are
invited to participate in the parade.

The program will be prepared and
published next week.
Public school pupils will furnish
flowers, and sixteen girls, from Yew
Park, will give a flag drill at night,
at Reed's opera house.

The following orders will be as-
signed positions in the parade: The
Indian school students with band;
the local companies of the National
Guard, under command of Major
Percy Willis; the A. O. U. W. and
other fraternal societies will be as-
signed position in the parade.

The Indian war veterans will
appear mounted on horseback and
will be assigned a position.

Chief Marshal F. B. Southwick will
be in charge of the parade.

SATURDAY IS THE DAY

Of the Amateur Athletic Meet at the
State Fair Grounds.

Should the present typical Oregon
summer weather continue until Sat-
urday the excellent race track at the
state fair grounds will be in splendid
condition for the contests of the local
athletic meet. It is authentically re-
ported that individual sprinters pro-
pose to establish, if possible, new
records for a number of the events,
and as a result of such determinations
some very pretty races may be antici-
pated.

The Chemawa Indian training
scho oband will make its second pub-
lic appearance and will discourse sweet
music throughout the afternoon. It
is the intention of the committee
having charge of the affair to begin
promptly at 1 o'clock and carry out
the program of fourteen events with
the least possible delay.

The city Y. M. C. A. team feels
confident of success while the univer-
sity team will make every effort to
carry off the pennant and many in-
dividual prizes. Nothing of import-
ance has been heard from the Che-
mawa team, but there may be a sur-
prise in store for those who attend
Saturday's contests. It might be
worth while to keep your eye on the
Indian boys in the sprinting and
jumping events, at least.

INTERCOLLEGIATE BASEBALL.
The series of baseball games that
were instituted among the various
colleges of the Willamette valley,
have almost been completed. On
Saturday afternoon the Albany In-
vincibles, of the Albany college,
vined the U. of O. team at Eugene,
and, judging from the score which
was 25 to 24 in favor of the Eugene
team, Albany Invincibles were con-
vinced by a very narrow margin at
least, that there are others who pos-
sess some knowledge of basepall.

Speaking of the game, the Guard of
Monday, the 17th inst contains the
following:

"The first inning looked very much
like an unusual large score would be
made by both sides, the score being 11
to 9 in favor of the visitors. After
that both teams did better work and
the game finished with 25 to 24 in fa-
vor of the U. of O. The home boys
had only two practices before the
game, but in spite of this played a
very good game.

TEAMS TO PLAY FINAL.

"McMinnville college and the Mon-
mouth state normal school teams
played at McMinnville the same day
the former team winning by a score of
10 to 2. The final is now to be played
between McMinnville college and the
U. of O. It will probably be played
Saturday, May 29. The place has not
been decided upon yet, but Eugene
being much the larger town should re-
ceive it, and could make it much
more to the financial interest of the
teams to secure the game."

REPAIRING

The Big Salem Bridge Sure.

Public Meeting Giving the City Full Power to Act.

Pursuant to the call of the mayor,
published in Tuesday's Statesman
only a meeting of citizens was held
at the council chamber at 7:30 p. m.,
to consider the question of the city of
Salem assisting in repairing the big
bridge. It was called to order by
mayor Richardson, who named Hon.
L. L. Patterson chairman, who stated
the object of the meeting. Mr. Rich-
ardson then made a statement of the
conditions to about forty citizens who
were present. He read from the city
ordinances and state laws the legal
points in controversy, and closed by
stating that if Salem would pay one-
third the expense the bridge would be
saved, and that otherwise it would
not be repaired. He stated the esti-
mated cost of the repairs to be \$2240.

Hon. T. Ford was called upon, and
stated that the bridge was solely the
property of the two counties and that
the city had no property interest in it
whatever. He maintained his points
with some further argument, but as
he stated that he was opposed to pay-
ment by the city, he spoke reluctantly.
His argument against Salem paying
was plain and logical, and he closed
by stating that Salem doesn't own
any interest in the bridge, and is un-
der no legal or moral obligation to
keep it in repair.

Ex-Alderman Rigdon took the floor
for a moment. He thought Mr. Ford
had underestimated the value of the
bridge to Salem. He favored the city
donating one-third of the cost of re-
pairs if it could do so without assum-
ing any further responsibility in it.
A letter was read from Ex-Alder-
man J. H. Albert favoring the city
paying one-third the repairs, in which
he set forth his reasons with some
historical data of value.

J. M. Wallace next spoke in a prac-
tical manner, strongly urging the im-
portance of repairing the bridge forth-
with. He stated that when the
petitions urging repairs which were
signed by over 600, were circulated,
not five per cent of the citizens re-
fused to sign the same.

He moved that it be the sense of
this meeting that the bridge shall be
repaired, and the city bear her share
of expense. Mr. Ford moved to
amend by stating that Salem would
assume no interest in the bridge ex-
cept as tax-payers of Marion county.
This was ruled out of order.

Dr. W. S. Mott moved to amend by
stating that the city would "donate"
one-third instead of "bear her share"
last. The original motion was put and
carried.

Dr. Mott then moved that the city
of Salem donate one-third of the ex-
pense of repairs, but refuse to have
any responsibility or ownership in the
bridge. John Gray then moved to
amend by giving the city council
full power to act. Carried as amended
the vote being close.

Maj. D. C. Sherman reviewed the
history of the building of the bridge,
and suggested that the two counties
constantly insisted that Salem is a
third owner in the bridge. He
thought the city ought to disclaim
any ownership in the structure.

The mayor then stated that all
these points had been presented to the
county courts by him, but without
avail.

C. P. Bishop favored repairing the
bridge as soon as possible, and leav-
ing the question of ownership until it
is finished.

Thos. Kay thought that because a
community donated a subsidy to a
bridge or factory it did not hold that
those donors should be compelled to
keep up the repairs. If the court will
not keep up its share let us elect a
court that will, said he.

C. Marsh suggested that if the

bridge is an orphan, let us convert it
into a toll bridge, and turn it over to
parties who will maintain it for the
profits. This he thought would de-
velop an owner very soon. He favored
Salem doing her share, but opposed
the city assuming any ownership in
it.

J. M. Martin also opposed assum-
ing any ownership, as the city might
thus become responsible for accidents
occurring.

M. L. Chamberlin opposed assum-
ing any responsibility or ownership
and made some very practical sugges-
tions to that end.

Mr. Ford suggested that the two
county courts had never been directly
petitioned to repair the bridge, but
had been jointly petitioned with the
city. He made a further plea for
keeping down city taxes. They were
getting too high for business men to
live and do business.

Mr. Richardson stated that the
estimated cost of repairs was \$2240,
and added that a certain party was
willing to assume the job at \$2000.

To the motion that the city simply
donate one-third the expense, Coun-
cilmnan Parkhurst replied that he
had grave doubts if the county courts
would receive it in that way, and
that it seemed to be understood by
the courts that the city would look
after all repair and jointly pay its
share.

It is presumed that the city will
now proceed to advertise for bids, and
let the contract at the earliest possi-
ble date.

Opera Company Coming.

forward to with no little interest.
Since the company was last heard

long time since any production has
so favorably impressed our people.
The management is deserving of the
highest praise for their enterprise in
securing a return date. The prima
donna, Miss Balch, is well known,
having been for years at the head of
the famous Bostonians and the prima
donna contralto is Miss Catherine
McNeill, a singer of great note. The
tenor is Harry Davis, the baritone
Charles Huntington while Eugene
Rodgers is the basso. A grand
march will also be introduced and no
pains will be spared in making the
evening memorable.

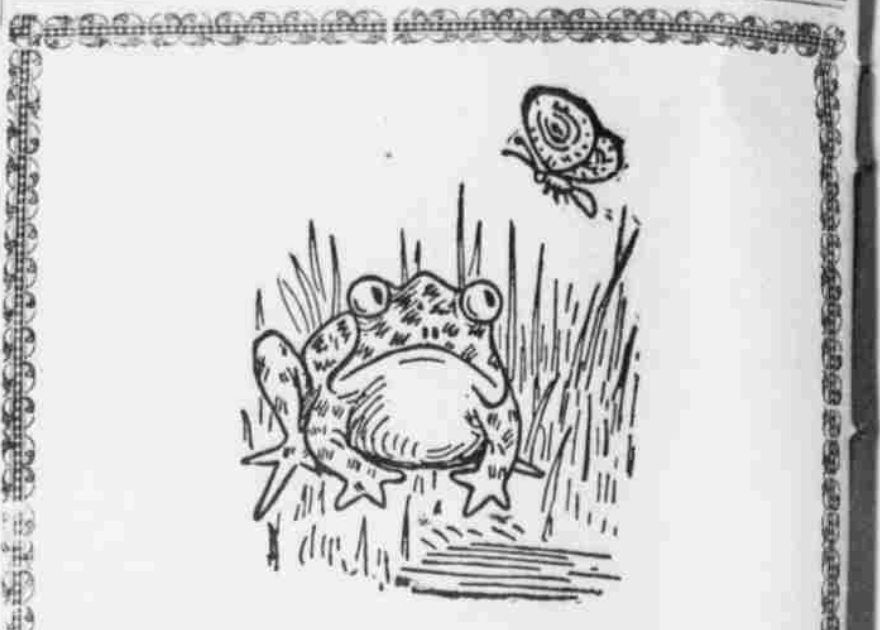
