STATE HOUSE NEWS.

Ralph Moody, attorney for the parties that have instituted mandamus proceedings against the secretary of state to compel the auditing of claims and issuance of warrants, has been here and perfected the appeal to the supreme court.

Ursula Gaulling, of Linn county, has been placed in the asylum. She is married, and is 64 years old.

The Mountain House Irrigation Company, of Walla Walla county, filed incorporation articles in the secretary of state's office; capital \$200; incorporators, R. A. Shinn, R. F. Shinn and W. J. Hays.

A. E. Wheeler, of Eugene, and H. M. Lines, of Independence, were today commissioned notaries public.

A dispatch from Salem, to a Portland paper, announcing a change in the superintendency of the reform school, needs correction. Superintendent Hendricks resigned April 3. The fact is the resignation has not yet reached the secretary of the board of trustees, who is away for a few days. It was placed in the hands of a member of the board at a date subsequent to April 3, and it was accompanied with a request that the board defer the removal until July. The board did not see fit to grant the request, hence the announcement that E. M. Croisan would supersede Mr. Hendricks on June 1. It has been stated by a local paper, of which Mr. Hendricks is the actual head, that the acceptance of the resignation and the election of Mr. Croisan were not concurred in by the secretary of State Kincaid. This is not true. It was authoritatively learned at the state house, today, that the secretary had made known to Governor Lord his wishes in the matter, and, though he was absent, he knew what it was designed to do, and expressly concurred in it.

DIED.

VAN EATON.—At the family home No. 384 Cottage street, at 8:30 a. m. Thursday, May 20, 1897, Albert, the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Van Eaton, aged 15 years 3 months and 7 days.

"Allie," as he was best known was taken ill eleven weeks ago tomorrow with typhoid fever from which he never recovered entirely. A few weeks later other complications set in and despite the best medical skill and tender care, death relieved the little sufferer this morning. The end was very peaceful, the spirit taking its flight while the little fellow was in a gentle slumber. At times Allie suffered intense pain but he bore his sufferings with remarkable fortitude and patience. The bereaved parents were buoyed up with hopes of an ultimate restoration to health, until Tuesday, when a noticeable change for the worse was observed and he began to sink rapidly, death occurring as mentioned above.

Allie joined the First Presbyterian church at the age of thirteen and has ever lived a consistent Christian life. He was a member of the present graduating class of the Salem public schools and was an especially bright and intelligent boy. The flag at the East school was placed at half-mast this morning out of respect to the death of Allie who was a general favorite, not only with his teacher and the members of his class, but also with whomever he came in contact. He was a joy and comfort to his parents.

The members of Allie's school class literally buried his desk with lovely bouquets of flowers today. The class will attend the funeral tomorrow afternoon in a body.

It is only two years next July since the hand of death removed another member of this family, a daughter, Ethel, a loveable Christian character, who at her death was but 7 days younger than Allie.

Allie leaves besides his parents, two brothers, Robbie and Plumer. The parents have the sympathy of a large circle of friends and neighbors in their bereavement.

Funeral services will be held from the family home at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon. Rev. William Steel of the First Presbyterian church officiating. Funeral cars will be in waiting at the intersection of Cottage and Chemeketa streets and the funeral party will proceed to City View cemetery where the remains will be laid to rest beside those of the sister of the deceased. It is quite likely members of the public school graduating class will serve as pallbearers.

Other News of the Country in a Condensed Form.

Sensation.

St. Louis, May 20.—The Republic says: A tremendous sensation has been produced in the ranks of the American Protective Association in every section of Missouri by the suspension of 18 councils of the order in St. Louis and Kansas City for participation in the recent convention held in this city under the misrepresentation that it was regularly called state council of the organization. In addition to this half a dozen of the most prominent members of several of the suspended councils have been individually suspended and will have to answer to charges before the regularly constituted authorities.

Strike.

PHILADELPHIA, May 20.—The coat-makers' branch of the garment-workers' union to the number of 260 joined the garment-workers' strike for an increase of wages. It is believed that unless the contractors accede to the demands there will be from 7000 to 8000 garment-workers on a strike by the end of the week.

French in Africa.

BRASS, Guinea Coast, May 20.—An expedition, presumably French, at French officers and men actively took part in it, captured and burned the town of Wawa, Bousa county. One hundred men were killed, and 200 made prisoners.

Bliss Will Retire.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—It is expected that General Bliss, who has been appointed major-general, will be retired from active service, at his own request, some day this week, under the 40-year service clause.

General J. R. Brooke, the commanding officer of the department of Missouri of Chicago, will then, it is expected, be promoted to the major-generalship, to retain that rank until he retires from service in 1902.

The president is expected to raise three colonels this week to the rank of brigadier-general to succeed Generals Forsyth, Bliss and Brooke. These changes will cause a general shaking-up in the army.

The departments of California, Dakota, Colorado, the Columbia and Texas will all have new commanders. General Brooke will remain in charge of the department of the Missouri.

Acquitted.

PITTSBURG, May 20.—The case of Lieutenant Edward S. Farrow, for conspiring to defraud the Mutual Reserve Life Fund Association of New York, was given to the jury an noon. At 4 o'clock, the jury returned a verdict of acquittal, and placed the costs on the insurance company.

For the Paris Exposition.

WASHINGTON, May 20.—The senate committee on international exposition decided to report favorably a resolution providing for an appropriation of \$350,000 for proper representation of this government at the Paris exposition of 1900.
