IDENTIFIED.

Was Unknown Man Meunz?

Coroner A. M. Clough Receives a Letter of Inquiry.

It is possible that the unknown man who was killed in this city by the south bound California overland on Thursday night, April 15th has at last been identified.

Coroner A. M. Clough received a letter today addressed: "To the Coroner or Morgue, Salem, Or." The envelope had the postmark of San Francisco and was mailed on the 25th inst. On the back of the envelope was written: "If not called for in ten days, return to 126 Langton street, San Francisco, Cal. Mrs. L. Meunz. The penmanship of the writer is very poor, and the spelling and general composition of the letter is quite poor.

Having slightly corrected the same, it is printed below:

SAN FRANCISCO, May 23, 1937.

Dear Sir: of morgue and coroner's inquest:

Please answer to this description of the man who was found dead one month before Eli Mackey, as my husband went up into that country for work. As I have not heard a word from him for two months I am afraid he is the party killed, for he was beating his way on the train.

His name is Fred Meunz. Height 5 feet 10 inches and weight 170 to 180 pounds, wears a heavy reddish mustache; has a round red face, black wavy hair; a mark in the part of his hair 2 1/2 inches long; has big fat hands and short fingers. He wore a medal of gold with a diamond in it, from a Journeyman's Brother Benevolent Protective Association.

It was a carving knife with a steel saw blade and on the rough side it bore the names of Past-President McVanderveer, to President Fred Meunz. He is 34 years old but looks younger.

Please be so kind to answer me for I am almost wild with two children and small at that. If any such a man is in your city please let me know. Please publish this in the papers for he may have been killed in some surrounding town. And oblige.

Mrs. Fred Meunz.

A postscript reads as follows:

"He is a butcher by trade and well liked. He is pleasant and a great politician. Tell me if he is there, please."

The description furnished Coroner Clough by Mrs. Meunz answers that of the man as regards his height, weight, mustache, and sandy complexion. Instead of black wavy hair the man had short dark brown hair. The medal to which the author of the letter refers was missing but this can be easily accounted for as the man may have disposed of the article for something to eat.

Coroner Clough today wrote the anxious wife and mother giving her a complete description of the man and also of the trinkets found upon his person by means of which the real identity of the man may yet be ascertained. In preparing the man for burial Coroner Clough also observed

several scars on the man's hands the thumbs especially, which strengthen the theory that the dead man was Fred Meunz, of San Francisco, from the fact that his trade was that of a butcher.

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EXAMINATION FOR GRADUATION.

As Usual Salem's Public Schools Will Observe Memorial Day.

Another successful year in the history of Salem public schools is about to close. At the first term a class numbering thirty-six bright young people were graduated from the schools and on June 11, a class numbering about forty-five of Salem's bright young people will have completed the public school course and be awarded the coveted diploma.

The final examination of the graduating class is now in progress and the results thus far attained have been extremely satisfactory to both teacher and pupil. The first examination, that of mental arithmetic, was given Monday of this week. History was the topic examined Wednesday. Examinations will be continued next week as follows:

Tuesday, written arithmetic; Thursday, grammar. On Monday, June 8, the last subject, civil government, will be examined.

Preparations are now under way for splendid commencement exercises, which will be held in Reed's opera house, Friday evening June 11.

Pres. P. L. Campbell, of the New-moath State Normal school has been invited to address the class.

The desk of Albert Van Eaton, a member of the graduating class, who died last Thursday, will be kept draped until the close of the term.

Final examinations in the other grades will begin on Thursday June 3rd, concluding on Wednesday, June 9th. Thursday the schools will be given a holiday that the teachers may have time to make out promotion cards, monthly and term reports. The schools will reconvene Friday morning when each student will learn "where he is."

As is the usual custom among the public schools of this city, memorial day will be very stringently observed this year. Appropriate exercises will be held in the various schools Friday afternoon to which the patrons of the school are cordially invited.
