The claim of H. J. Bigger for damages to buggy by defective crossing, rejected.

A petition of Marshal Dilley to have jail windows obscured from public gaze, as well as some other needed improvements about the building, referred to city hall committee with power to act.

A protest was read from the insurance men of the city against the tax of \$40 a year. Referred to ordinance committee.

Chairman Parkhurst of the street committee, offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed with full power to act in connection with the county courts of Marion and Polk, upon the terms agreed on at the conference of the city and county courts of Marion and Polk to make plans, specifications and advertise for bids to repair the Willamette river at Salem. The city assuming one-third of such repairs, not to exceed \$2,500 total cost, with the understanding on the part of the city council that such action is without prejudice to either of the parties respecting the ownership or further liability for repairs on said bridge.

The street committee was named to act in this capacity.

The projecting easter at the intersection near the Fashion stable was ordered removed.

The street commissioner explained to the council why he had dispensed with the services of Mr. McKillop and the scavenger cat, assigning purely economical reasons. The council, however, ordered him reinstated, and the good work of cleaning our streets will continue as heretofore.

The Baseball Tournament.

The local baseball team is not well pleased with the provision of prizes for the baseball tournament, made by the state fair management at a recent meeting. By participating in a game in which cash prizes are offered, the members of the team would therefore be classed as "professional" players. The members of the team are not willing to be so classed and cannot well afford to, when the remuneration is only \$75 for first prize. The team suggests that the state fair management reconsider its first offer and give the amount of the prize in merchandise or in suitable medals. It is hoped the suggestion will be favorably acted upon by the executive committee for by so doing interest in the tournament would be greatly increased. The local team has always lacked a suitable pitcher but the vacancy will now be filled by Chester G. Murphy, who has just returned from Stanford. Charles L. McNary, another Stanford student, is mentioned as a favorable candidate for the position of third baseman on the team. Russell Coleman, better known as "Brick," will soon return from Eugene and will probably be given a place on the team. With these changes, Salem will have a baseball nine of which she may well feel proud.

STATE FIELD DAY.

Large Delegations Expected From Willamette Valley Points.

The third annual meet of the intercollegiate Field Day association will be held at the state fair grounds, in this city, on next Saturday. Arrangements are being made for the reception and entertainment of the visiting delegations.

Excursions will be run from valley points and the attendance promises to be much larger than ever before. A big excursion will be run from Corvallis, which will also bring the Albany delegations. There will also be a large delegation up from Newberg, via steamboat. The "Quaker City" band that took the second prize in the state contest, at Portland, two years ago, will accompany the delegation and will play at the games and on the streets.

There will be a business meeting of the I. A. A. O., in this city, at 2:30 p. m., Friday, when the officers of the day will be determined upon.

It is reported that there will be a large crowd up from Portland and Oregon City. The Eugene delegation will likely charter a car and come down on the overland, returning in the evening.

A force of men has been set to work on the race track and by Saturday the same will no doubt be in excellent condition for the racing events.

From the fact that the visiting delegations will be obliged to return home as soon as the exercises at the fair grounds are concluded, there will be no reception or entertainment given in the opera house as was done last year. Excursion boats will leave immediately after the games and the Eugene team will probably return via the 8:30 o'clock overland.

The Chemawa Indian school band has been engaged to furnish the music which is alone a sufficient guarantee that the musical exercises of the day will be of a high order.

It is the intention of those managing the meet, to begin the exercises promptly at 2 o'clock which it is thought will enable them to complete the program by 6 o'clock. The admission to the grounds will be 50 cents. While this may be thought to be rather expensive, yet it will be considered a nominal fee in return for the entertainment that will be furnished. There will be no additional charge for seats in the grand stand.
