The Union conference at Albany has resulted in the formation of a new political party in Oregon. Reading over the names of the delegates shows that prominent Republicans, Democrats and People's Party were participants. The proceedings were businesslike and no exciting or violent speeches made, no buncombe resolutions thrown out. The men comprising the convention were the best type of aggressive intelligent, patriotic American manhood. The partisan office-seeking type was conspicuous by its absence. Not a political loss or party manager put in appearance at the birth of the new Union party.

It was not to be expected that the Democrats, the People's or the American Bimetallist parties would favor a Union of forces and voluntarily abandon their respective party organizations. There had to be affirmative action for Union by some new and outside organization as a preliminary step towards consolidation of the silver parties. That can now be accomplished and we believe will be accomplished. There will be some friction and some resistance. Men trained in the old party organizations do not easily surrender their personal advantages accruing from political organization. But surrenders will be made and sacrifices will be made.

The money question is placed to the front in the declaration of principles. The platform of the Union party will have to be made in its first state convention. This outline, as a basis of Union, is sufficient to satisfy any student of the monetary problem. The declaration that all paper money shall be issued by the government direct; that all money issued by the government shall be a full legal tender for any payment to citizens or to the government on equal terms; that no law or contract shall be permitted to discriminate against any kind of government money;—these are essential elementary propositions that strike at the root of the present monopoly and syndicate system that robs the government and oppresses the people. No government money should be redeemable in any other kind of money; all currency should be good enough to pay on any debt or on any obligation to the government for taxes or interest. The government money subject to any exceptions is a mockery and a snare. All money should be interchangeable, and once issued should not be taken up, cancelled, destroyed, or "redeemed" with some other money, or issues of bonds. Contraction of the currency by any scheme is a crime against the producer. The issuing of money for 70,000,000 people cannot be left to the interest of corporations and syndicates. The government must be sovereign absolute in this vital function, or the people will become serfs and vassals of the money power.

The platform declares for the referendum on all legislation, and by placing all nominations in the hands of the people by direct ballot, at the primaries, makes all officials responsible to the people instead of being responsible, as they are now, to the party machine. This places the initiative of all reforms where it belongs, with the citizen at the primary, at the very inception of all political activity.

The Union party starts out as all new parties do—a clean party. We believe it is not a one man party and is not subject to or dominated by any political faction or under the influence of any of the so-called bosses of Oregon politics. It is believed the people of Oregon have been so long bossed and party-ridden that they will welcome a revolution in this respect. They must educate themselves to think and act for themselves. If they ever hope to achieve freedom from machine dictatorship and corrupt leaders. The result in government can rise no higher than the source. If the source is a boss and a machine the stream of politics will be polluted from the beginning and the result unsatisfactory. If the source of power be with the people, and both the inception and the result be referred back to the people, government will be restored to the hands of the people. To this cause of a restoration of popular power the Union party is dedicated. If it uses its power wisely and trusts the people in all things it will prosper; if not, it will go into the chaos of confusion and corruption.

It is to be hoped that the senate committee will decide to send Gov. Lord's senator back home without a seat. The mildest thing that can be said of him is that he is an unscrupulous old curmudgeon who would be just as ready to serve the interests of the corporations as his predecessor.—Representative Emery's paper.

The people were ready to overlook Mitchell's being a corporation attorney so long as he championed free coinage and election of senators by the people. But when he proved that in behalf of party he would lay down all principle he did not consider his Republicanism as genuine—as his devotion to his clients. If Corbett serves a corporation it is not because he has been given a retainer. He hires attorneys to look after his various corporations and it is not unlikely that he may give a man of Mitchell's ability a job. If we have to have corporation senators, the people will prefer to deal with principals to hired agents any time, because no direct responsibility attaches to agency under any circumstances. While Mr. Corbett would not poll as big a popular vote for senator as Mr. Mitchell, Republicans ought to prefer a man of sound principles to a man who seemed willing to say: "I have no principles on the money question that I am not willing to abandon to secure office". If both are corporation men, the odds are still in favor of Corbett.

It is notorious enough that the U. of O. has had to fight for its very life against drowning in the dirty pool of state and local politics, and that the outcome of the struggle is still in doubt.—Oregonian.

Is it possible that such a state of affairs exists in gold standard Oregon? We thought, from recent reading of the Oregonian that only in wicked free silver Washington politics is allowed to influence educational matters.—Roseburg Review.

Gold or silver don't make politics clean or dirty. The ideas of the public service held by the men at the heads of departments and in control of institutions, has something to do with it.

Dingley says his tariff bill was designed not only to bring in sufficient revenue but to create a surplus with which the greenbacks may be redeemed and be retired from circulation. Is that what you were whipped into line to vote for McKinley for? What do the soldiers who fought, bled and died for greenbacks think about it? Has the old greenback got to go up the golden stair? The people don't want paper money that has to be redeemed over and over for a syndicate.

On Monday, July 12, Hon. Wm. J. Bryan of Nebraska will speak at the Oregon City Chautauqua assembly on Bimetallism. Excursion trains will be run all day to and from Oregon City and no other speaker will fill the big building as full as it will be when Mr. Bryan speaks there. Religious people who were taught last year that Mr. Bryan was a mere agitator, an apostle of unrest, if not worse, will have an opportunity to correct that impression by a personal observation.

Jacksonville Times, Democrat: Senator McBride doesn't like the wool schedule of the tariff bill, and thinks it should be higher on the second and third classes. He claims that as much wool will be imported to make clothing under these two classes, as it was before, when there was a great deal more carpet wool imported than could have possibly been used in the construction of carpets, etc. As the manufacturers prefer a low tariff on this article, the sheepmen are likely to get much less "protection" than they wish. The interests of the East must be conserved first, you know.

The Chautauqua Society at Oregon City is to have Bryan deliver his lecture on "Bimetallism". Since it is supposed to be an unpartisan society, it should invite Harvey Scott to lecture on "Gold Standard". Any thing short of admitting an argument upon the other side of the question, will lead to the belief that the society is Demo-Populist.—Baker City Republican. We heartily second the motion.

Jacksonville will be the only town in Jackson county to celebrate this year.

The editor of the Newberg Graphic has been appointed postmaster of that place.

The round house formerly at Grants Pass will be moved to Roseburg and added to the building at Roseburg.

Lane county has a new rock crusher. It will crush from 10 to 18 tons per hour and requires 12 horses to operate it.

A granary and its contents, belonging to J. T. Spough, of Looking-Glass, burned last Tuesday. There is no insurance.

It is reported that diggings have been struck on Silver creek, Josephine county, which pay \$15 to the man per day.

The Cathura warehouse, of Corvallis, burned down Wednesday. The value of the property was about \$16,000; insured for \$2,500.

The party who stole the telescope at the U. of O., at Eugene Wednesday also stole two lamps and some kerosene oil, worth in all about \$15.

The people of Pilot Rock have offered a reward of \$100 for the arrest and conviction of the persons that burglarized John Sylvester's store last Saturday.

J. W. Taylor of Eugene, sued J. N. B. Fuller in the circuit court for \$500 damages for defamation of character in circulating alleged false and damaging reports.

Corvallis and Peoria are now connected by telephone. The new line is just completed, and is owned and operated by the Corvallis Flouring Mills, which has a branch warehouse at Peoria. The distance is 12 miles.

J. M. Hamilton, whose back was broken while he was attempting to get off a brakebeam in front of the Umatilla house in The Dalles about two weeks ago, died Sunday at the Wasco county poor farm.

The crew of the Mathoma expect to complete the wing-dam at East river bar near Corvallis this week. An 800-foot dam, well constructed, will prove a blessing to river navigators in the future.

The building, furniture and fixtures of the First National bank, of Hillsboro, were sold Monday to Shute and Foot, for \$2000. The property was formerly valued at \$4,000 in the statements of the bank's assets.

Early Wednesday morning four fishing boats, some reports say six, were upset in the breakers at the mouth of the river and one man, John Marjantini, is known to have been drowned, while at least two others are missing.—Astoria Budget.

The Dalles Chronicle says that the Hood River strawberry crop was considerably damaged by the hot weather. The berries were not "cooked" but their ripening was forced so that a large percentage of very small and unsaleable berries is the result.

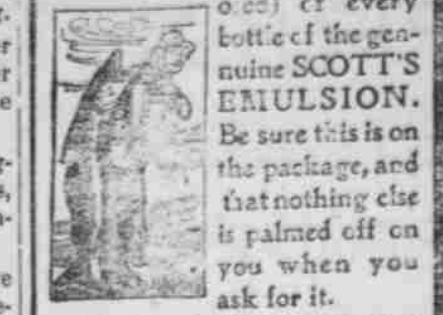
